A Word from Penny

on Monday morning, January 16, surrounded by 50 people from the CCSM community, I received the Martin Luther King Jr award on our behalf, given by San Mateo County to CCSM. We were chosen as this year's honorary organization for our work in LGBT rights and our work in housing. It was a cold, crisp morning and MLK's spirit at the CalTrain station was palpable. Many others from CCSM volunteered for the MLK day of service with other faith communities.

I felt honored that we were chosen and that I was privileged to represent the dedicated CCSM community. I also felt humbled. To be recognized as an organization carrying on the legacy of Dr. King is a heavy mantle to wear. The dream he so eloquently articulated over half a century ago and imprinted on the soul of so many in our nation is as fragile today as it has ever been.

The social issues that are arising in our country reflect the painful realities of racism, bigotry, Islamophobia, homophobia and anti-Semitism. Already, signs of hate and fear are affecting our neighbors, and potential new policies will strip people of protections and benefits that their families depend on.

And so, our work continues. Our work for peace and justice done

Add the youth group meetings to your calendars: High School meet right after church until 2:00PM, Mid-High on first and third Sunday nights, 6-7:30PM.





Although the U.S. has just 5% of the world's population, it has about 25% of the world's prisoners, and more than 60% of the U.S prisoners are people of color. Couple that fact with the 13th constitutional amendment, which abolished slavery except as "punishment for crime," and slavery seems to live on—evolved into our modern system of mass incarceration, one in which many prisons are run by for-profit companies where prisoners can be paid a pittance to work for corporations. The 13th amendment "loophole" allowing forced labor for criminals has enabled resentful white society to imprison black citizens on minor charges and put them to work. Join us for lunch, viewing the documentary, and discussion afterwards.

LMT: CONGREGATIONAL PERSPECTIVES ON **DEVELOPMENT OF A LATINO MINISTRY**

As part of our work, the Latino Ministry Team has interviewed 32 current congregational members in order to hear their perspectives on possible establishment of a Latino/a ministry as part of CCSM. This was not a random sample. Rather, we identified people whom at least one of us thought of as reasonably widely acquainted in the congregation.

Two-thirds of the people we talked with were supportive of establishing such a ministry—many of them very enthusiastic. About a quarter were neutral on the idea. Generally, they said that exploring the potential is a good idea and that they would be fine with such a ministry, if the exploration finds sufficient interest. Five people were opposed to the idea.

Strikingly, almost all of the interviewees in their 20s and 30s favored establishment of such a ministry. A majority of members in the 40 to 70+ age group were also supportive, but almost all who were neutral and all who were negative were in this group, Should we

Those who support establishing such a ministry, assuming sufficient interest among Latinos, pointed out that San Mateo's Latino population is already substantial, and it is growing. Moreover, the neighborhood nearest our Church is predominantly Latino. Some emphasized the need for CCSM to respond to these

changing demographics, and some said that Latinos need a progressive Christian option. Some felt that the added diversity of our congregation would make it more interesting for everyone and more attractive to potential members. Several anticipated that a Latino ministry would attract more youth and families to CCSM.

A few of those opposed to establishment of a Latino ministry expressed the view that our Church has more important priorities. Most

assumed that Latinos generally are Catholic or conservative Protestants, and therefore few would be attracted to CCSM. Even if we were to find sufficient interest among Latinos, some questioned whether Latinos would feel

comfortable in the CCSM community.

If CCSM does establish a Latino ministry, what are interviewees' hopes for it? Above all, people expressed the desire that it be a part of our congregation as a whole, not a separate congregation that just uses space at CCSM. Many expressed a desire for **shared** worship services, at least some of the time. and a few suggested a common coffee hour even if services are separate. (A number also anticipated that some services might be at a different time, perhaps even on a different day.) Many said that CCSM should create opportunities for sharing meals, for participating together in common social and cultural activities, and collaborating in social-justice efforts. A number of people emphasized that all children should be

> together in church school and youth groups.

> Nearly all of those we interviewed asked for more communication about our exploration of a possible Latino ministry, as our work continues, and some asked for opportunities to participate in building relationships. Some are eager to hear our Church's vision for a Latino ministry as part of CCSM

as a whole. If at some point CCSM is asked to support establishment of a Latino ministry, some interviewees asked for a clear plan and for metrics to monitor progress.

We on the Latino Ministry Team are grateful for those who took the time to talk with us, and eager to talk with others who are interested. Please express your encouragement, ideas, and concerns to any of us.
