
SNEAK PEEK: Fall Sermon Series Re-Imagining G-d: A Spiritual Revolution

Creativity, an Antidote to Fear: The Artistry and Aptitudes of the CCSM Family

In this challenging and disturbing time for our world, our nation, our community, and, in some cases, our own lives, we long for hope and look for inspiration. Within our CCSM community are those individuals who have found ways to navigate the waters of anxiety or despair and raise both themselves and others up in joy and gratitude. Please join us for our summer series and be stirred by the stories of those who are addressing their disquiet by applying their passion!

7/15 Mauricio Palma: A Father's Legacy

Mauricio's paintings were inspired by the song "Angelitos Negros" (music by Manuel Alvarez Renteria) and poem "Pintame Angelitos Negros" (Paint Black Angels) by Andres Eloy Blanco from Venezuela, which formed the song's lyrics. The words offered a critique of the painters during colonial Latin America who excluded the images of the Afro Latino, indigenous and mixed-race populations, in their murals. When he painted the first angel, he wanted to give his daughter the gift of a companion that looked like her, an angel with dark curls and cinnamon skin.

7/22 Kathy Nelson: A Musician's Magic

Kathleen J. Nelson is an accomplished musician, author, educator, motivational speaker and coach. Performing and teaching since 1990, she has written over a hundred songs. Her passion is to inspire people to action, and her love for writing and teaching along with her motivational and moving songs provides her with a unique set of tools to reach people at the heart level.

7/29 Mike Armacost: A Peacemaker's Story

Mike worked in government for 24 years, with service at the State Department, the Pentagon, and the National Security Council, and was Chief of Mission in Manila and Tokyo. From his expansive knowledge and experience, he'll focus in this talk on major current developments in East Asia and their implications for the United States. Mike was born in Cleveland, educated at Carleton College and Columbia University, and taught at Pomona College, International Christian University, and Stanford.

8/5 Brian Matthews: An Innovator's View

This talk will look at innovation in three chapters: the past, the process, and the future. First we'll learn about "The Innovation Genome Project" which studied 2.6 million years of human innovation and categorized a list of the 1,000 most important innovations in history. The result? A list of 7 essential questions that guide any innovation. Second, we'll study the hidden insights of the "Marshmallow Challenge," a fun team-building competition performed by thousands of people worldwide which teaches how team dynamics affects innovation. Finally, we'll study the future of computer-based innovation with "Generative Design," which has the opportunity to improve many of the world's problems beyond man's ability to solve alone.

8/12 Anne Anderson: A Writer's Solace

Frank works as a Facial plastic and Reconstructive Surgeon for Kaiser Permanente in the East Bay. He makes an annual trip to Hanoi, Vietnam, performing reconstructive surgery for children born with microtia, a congenital absence of the ear.


