LOOKING TOWARD LENT WISDOM FROM THE WILDERNESS

There are so many varied metaphors that we can apply to the past year, but the notion of a wilderness experience is particularly fitting. Wilderness is also a profound component of the Christian season of Lent as we remember the 40 days that Jesus spent in the wilderness prior to his death, which echoes the 40 years that the Israelites spent wandering in the wilderness centuries before.

This Lent, we are both very much still in the "wilderness," but also perhaps at a point where we can look back to the past year and ask what wisdom we have gained personally, as a church, as a nation, and as a world. The past year has been profoundly grief-filled and unsettling, and has also unmasked many of the deep inequities in our society and our world. Some have even spoken of this year as apocalyptic in part in the most ancient sense of the term: meaning uncovering or revealing. Those of us with various forms of privilege (access to health care, white privilege, economic means, etc) have been confronted by

CHILDREN, YOUTH & FAMILIES

The past months have been busy for the Children, Youth, and Family ministry programs at CCSM—although of course quite differently so! We are so grateful for technology (and the postal system!) which allows us to continue to meet, share, connect, pray, sing, and even play together. I am so blessed to have wonderful colleagues and collaborators: Lily Gonzales, Shannon McEntee, Libby Barnard, Laura Keating-Clevidence, Julie Berk, Tara Abrams, Dave Olson, Bill Dunbar, Mike Mullery, SO many Confirmation mentors, parent supporters, and of course the kids and youth themselves!

For our youngest kids, Lily continues with a wonderful mail ministry where she writes letters to each of the kids. I can't tell you how special it is for our kids to receive things addressed to them! Shannon has been so creative in expanding our Godly Play (Montessori-based curriculum) to a Zoom format. Favorite memories for me have included having the kids "play baptize" favorite stuffed animals and explore the sign of the cross by arranging toys in their homes.

Libby continues to adapt her programming to our largely Zoomed-out primary school aged kids by shifting to less-frequent Zoom gatherings and special mailed "do at your own pace" activity packs that she had delivered personally (or mailed, in the case of our non-local participants!). Mailed packages also continue to be an important way to connect with our Wednesday gathering kids and youth. I have also continued to send periodic mail (including seasonally-related treats, activities, cards, etc.) to all of our kids and youth—over 150 on my mailing list! If you are not on the list and would like to be—please let me know.

We also continue to have amazing monthly all-ages music sessions with Julie—which work surprisingly well on Zoom and have had periodic support and fellowship gatherings for parents hosted by Tara. Thank you SO much!

For our youth, we have launched a brand new Sunday mid-day program on faith and the media. We figured that since we are looking at screens regardless, we might as well explore some things made for that format! We have brainstormed a large list of faith, religion, and meaning-related questions that we will be considering in relationship to movies, TV shows, video games, poems, books, memes -- whatever our youth suggest and want to explore. I am excited to delve more deeply into learning what they are enjoying and what it means to them. So far we have had a wonderful session discussing the new Disney+ movie "Soul." Lots of religious fodder there such as questions of what happens before/after one dies, where personality and identity come from, etc. I highly recommend it.

For our high school aged youth, our main focus has been Confirmation, although there are also social activities, game nights, service opportunities, etc taking place as well. I am so blown away by the nearly 20 youth from CCSM who are participating in our multi-church Confirmation Class. It is also amazing to work with talented and passionate ministers from around the Bay Area! Because it is such a large class, opportunities for the youth to have adult mentors from CCSM to process and connect with has been especially important and meaningful. I am so very grateful to each of them. Recent confirmation class topics have included the Bible (including a focus on historical-critical, feminist, and liberation approaches to scripture) and Radical Christian History (exploring, for example, the Catholic Worker Movement, Civil Rights Movement, and Liberation Theology).

Many of our youth participated in the **Peninsula Multi-Faith Day of Service** on Martin Luther King Jr. Day. There were both in-person (distanced) and online service projects ranging from community clean-ups to discussions of Letter from a Birmingham Jail to making cards for seniors to knitting/sewing blankets. The day began with powerful speeches from local politicians and community faith leaders - which, unlike normal years when everyone is spread out at different projects - could be done altogether via Zoom!

Although many of our kids and youth are tired of online school, others also report that there are some silver linings, like not having to commute to school, having more flexible schedules, being able to do school (and church!) from anywhere (including fun locales like Lake Tahoe!) and having more time to connect with family. So while it isn't ideal, I am so moved by the perseverance of our families as well as the many leaders, volunteers, and supporters of the CYF ministry.

the reality that has existed long before this year in a new and perhaps clearer way.



Each week, we will explore a different sacred story from this book, looking for the wisdom that it might offer to us in the present moment as we look to and anticipate a future beyond the present wilderness.

Caste examines the unspoken caste system that has shaped America and shows how our lives today are still defined by a hierarchy of human divisions.

SAN MATEO COUNTY JUVENILE JUSTICE & DELINQUENCY PREVENTION COMMISSION: SECOND HOUR ON MARCH 7

San Mateo County is one of the wealthiest counties in the state and in the country and ranks high on equity measures according to the Social Progress Index. However, in the equity subcategories of residential isolation and residential segregation, our county significantly underperforms the rest of the state. And in those isolated, segregated and underserved neighborhoods in San Mateo County, we see the highest incidence of juvenile justice involved youth.

The San Mateo County Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention Commission (JJDPC) is a group of volunteers appointed by the Superior Court and Board of Supervisors to be a public conscience in the best interest of juveniles. The Commission advocates for programs and services that prevent youth entry into the juvenile justice system and promotes respect for the human dignity of all minors who do enter the system.



Commissioners Paul Bocanegra and Monroe Labouisse will join us at **SECOND HOUR on MARCH 7** to talk about the current state of juvenile justice in San Mateo County and what the JJDPC would like to do about it.

Paul Bocanegra is the co-founder of Reevolution Group, a Human Rights Watch Officer for the Children's Division of Human Rights Watch, and a certified drug and alcohol counselor. Paul was sentenced to life without parole (LWOP) when he was 16 years old and served more than 25 years in adult prison. He describes himself as a survivor of Juvenile LWOP and the California prison system. Today, Paul works to reform the juvenile criminal justice system by sharing his experiences and struggles within the juvenile and adult systems and institutions.

Monroe Labouisse is a former Silicon Valley executive who is now dedicated to civic and political projects. His tech company jobs included running Customer Service and Trust & Safety for Airbnb, and Consumer Protection for eBay and PayPal. He is a mentor to young men on probation through CASA of San Mateo, where he is also a Peer Supervisor, and he is also a mentor through Peninsula Bridge, which supports teens from low-income families aspiring to go to and complete college.

"CREATING THE CLIMATE CHURCH" RECAP

When asked what level of hope he has in substantial climate progress being made during the Biden era, Rev. Jim Antal provided a unique response. "Hope does not come from optimism, but rather from the amount of effort you put into solving the problem." This exchange characterized the depth of wisdom shared by our two guest panelists Rev. Antal and Ms. Karenna Gore during our recent online "Creating the Climate Church" program. The program was presented by the Energy & Environmental Justice ministry at CCSM, moderated by member Gary H. White and assisted by leader Warren Long. Invitations were sent out to numerous activists of the climate movement and a wide range of religious leaders and members from a variety of faith traditions.

With nearly 200 participants patching in for the stimulating 90-minute program, our audience was treated to an insightful and stimulating exploration of the intersection of climate change and religion. Ms. Gore offered a detailed description of the work of the Center for Earth Ethics where she is founder and director. She described an eco-minister training program for ministers in mid-career. Later in the conversation, Rev. Antal outlined the many ways he believed a church can build a climate culture. They included the need for the minister to preach regularly about the climate emergency at

least once a month, the importance of greening the operations of the church, and the idea of partnering with a secular climate organization to resist the fossil fuel industry's attempt to prevent a transition to a renewable energy economy. Feedback on the program was universally positive.

THANKS FROM YOUR TREASURER

On behalf of the Finance Committee and the Board of Directors, I want to express deep appreciation for your generosity to CCSM during this difficult pandemic. You may have heard me say it at the Congregational meeting in January: Donations to the General Fund in 2020 were more than \$60,000 over budget! Also, I had not expected we would receive pledge donations in a single month exceeding the all-time high of \$88,000 in December 2019, but we did so in December 2020, when we received just over \$96,000! Total revenue for the year was \$50,000 less than budget owing to the necessary cancellation of the Pick-a-Party fundraiser and from less revenue from long-term tenants and one-time rentals. But total expenses were also about \$50,000 less than budget, so we ended the year close to our \$25,000 budgeted shortfall, which we covered with reserve funds before closing the books for the year.

The Finance Committee has monitored our revenue each week since March 2020. Because of your generosity, we were able to continue full compensation for all our clergy and staff – avoiding furloughs, layoffs, and across-the-board reductions in compensation. We were able to reduce our rental income expectations from our very good

tenants. We have laid the groundwork to livestream our in-person services, once they resume, to continue to include a wider beloved community who have joined us during shelter-in-place. We have supported our



partners working for social justice at nearly triple the rate of former years from your plate offerings. All of this, and more, thanks to your generosity.

We are still a little short of our pledge goal of \$620,000. If you haven't pledged for 2021 yet, please consider doing so at ccsm-ucc.org/stewardship-2021.

Remember that your donations to CCSM fund our vision to be a strong voice for Progressive Christianity on the San Francisco Peninsula, to build a beloved community, and to lead in championing social justice for all. Our heartfelt "thank you" to all who contribute to this vision.

LATINX MINISTRY UPDATE

Our Latinx congregation within CCSM continues strong, but its participants have faced special challenges during the pandemic. Encouragingly, in some cases other CCSM members are responding in very helpful ways. For example, two of our 'Sunday congregation' members are providing online tutoring for Latino boys for whom distance learning has compounded the difficulties of studying in a new school system. A third is mentoring a Latino boy who is participating in the confirmation class.

Concerned about Latinx families' loss of income during this time, the Band of Brothers surveyed its members to see if any needed help with the kind of domestic work that some of our Latinx congregants do. So far that small survey has led to two new jobs for housekeepers that will begin as soon as the employing families are vaccinated, one yardwork job, and two job opportunities in a business owned by one of our Sunday congregants.

Our Wednesday people are getting direct benefits from these relationships, and so are the Sunday people who are involved. Furthermore, each of these relationships has a chance to develop into the kind of personal friendship and caring for each other that enrich the lives of all of us in CCSM and help our congregation grow toward the 'kindom of God.'

The Latinx Ministry is beginning to consider ways to broaden opportunities for such personal relationships between Wednesday and Sunday congregation members, especially when greater personal interaction becomes possible. We welcome volunteers who would like to tutor or who have work that Latinx (and other) congregants could do, and we also welcome additional ideas for building cross-congregational relationships.

REFLECTIONS ON A LIFE LOST DURING A PANDEMIC

My Mom, Ellie, passed away on January 4, 2021 on Cape Cod. I am finding her loss especially challenging due to the restrictions of the pandemic. First. I had to come to terms with the fact that I could not be at her beside at the time of her passing. Although I was able to spend hours on the phone with her,



singing to her, reading her scripture, and telling her our family stories. But it was very hard, especially being a nurse, not to be there to hold her hand and stroke her forehead. And now, the memorial service will need to be postponed indefinitely, which leaves a gap in the process of grief and closure.

I am very grateful that near the end, I was able to sing her favorite song to her: "Goodnight, My Someone" and I told her at the end of our call, as I always did, that I was giving her a kiss on her forehead. The Hospice nurse told me that when I said that, Mom held the phone up to her forehead to receive my kiss. I will forever cherish that memory as I now walk the path without her. Grief is never easy. But those of us who have the added challenge of pandemic restrictions layered onto the process of grief have a new set of difficulties added. My heart goes out to all of you who share this double burden with me.

In the meantime, please save the date – we will be having a "Ding-a-Ling" Social Thurs, 2/25 from 7:30 – 8:30 pm.



The National Prayer Service was held the morning after the Inauguration of President Biden and Vice President Kamala Harris at Washington National Cathedral. The theme of the service was focused on inclusivity and healing for our nation. Bishop William J. Barber, II DMin. gave the homily for the service which included prayers in numerous faiths from around the country. We were stunned to learn shortly before the service that National Cathedral organist, Thomas Sheehan had selected

Angela Kraft Cross's "Healing" from her composition "Journey to Wholeness" for the postlude of the service which was televised internationally. CCSM is proud to celebrate with Angela this very special honor.

In addition, Angela is serving as a piano judge for the Junior Bach Festival which is a Berkeley-headquartered music festival since 1953 featuring regional young musicians playing the music of J.S. Bach on many different instruments, ranging from piano to violin, from marimba to organ. With the Covid 19 pandemic, the festival has continued but virtually, enabling musicians across the country and even in Japan to apply. As well, a few of the judges this year are in Holland. Amazingly enough, the last few years, the Junior Bach Festival has attracted record numbers of

PANDEMIC PUTS CONCERT OF PICCOLO AND FLUTE ON HOLD

At the height of December 2020 music activity, we had hoped to bring to the community of CCSM a concert of music celebrating the numerous cultures of the winter: Diwali, one of the major festivals celebrated by Hindus, Jains and Sikhs; Hanukkah, the Jewish festival commemorating the recovery of Jerusalem and rededication of the Second Temple; and Christmas. Sudden changes to the recording schedule due to the pandemic caused us to put a halt to the production of the Flute Concert and, by the time we were able to return to filming the concert, both Diwali and Hanukkah had passed. But, we have been able to present many of the pieces during the Sunday service and will continue to cameo pieces throughout the year.

We are so fortunate to have been blessed with the talent of a flautist and good friend of mine, Marian Concus, who planned, created, and recorded these pieces for us.

Marian Concus is a versatile flutist in the Bay Area. She currently is a member of Fremont Symphony/Opera/Ballet and Santa Cruz Symphony. Her impressive biography and experience can be viewed at mconcusflutist.com.

One of the themes we incorporated into the concert was flute and piccolo music from Philadelphia, PA. The Declaration of Independence was signed there, and Frederick the Great, King of Prussia, a financier of the Revolutionary War, also happened to be a flautist. His court flutist was Quantz, and Marian performed for us one of his pieces. Philadelphia has been one of the cen-

ters of music for more than 100 years and the great xylophonist, Jacob Hoffmann, composed



two pieces that have been aired on Sundays during the CCSM Sunday service, a Doina and "Eateleh." We also recorded pieces by Philadelphia composer Daniel Dorff.


Here's how it will work:

Learning Ministry in a Global Pandemic

For most of my life, I never thought I'd go into ministry. But God surprises us: Not only am I here, but I'm doing it 100 percent virtually. And I have to admit it's been hard. When I started seminary in 2018, I was full of energy and ideas about the future of church: how it could change, grow, and ultimately be reborn. But none of these ideas involved being online. In fact, during my time at CCSM, I've realized a lot of things about virtual church are counter to my own theology. Coronavirus has stretch me to think about connection in ways I'd never considered.

Being a pastoral intern in this moment has also made me infinitely more aware of the real issues people are facing right now: crippling wealth inequality, a rising mental health crisis – especially among our youth – political polarization, and unprecedented loneliness. Jesus said he came that we "may have life, and have it to the full" (John 10:10). What, then, is the purpose of ministry other than to help address the demons that keep us from experiencing that full life? I'm often troubled by the ways I feel so inadequate in attending to these urgent needs.

Over and over, I have to remember that grace abounds.

I've been at CCSM almost a year, and still haven't met the vast majority of our members in person. As someone who sees ministry through the lens of relationship, this breaks my heart. But I believe God is still at work even through a cell phone or a computer



screen. Maybe my time at CCSM is less about learning to minister the conventional way, and more about harnessing the energy it will take to radically re-imagine ministry during and after COVID. After all, that's what being a spiritual leader is all about: Not "running the show as circus directors," as Henri Nouwen said, but being courageous enough to listen to the deep and significant movements of the spirit. She is always speaking to us, even when she isn't saying what we thought we wanted to hear.
