Our aim is for the return to the sanctuary be as safe as possible for as many as possible. We will continue to meet outdoors on the lawn in July (those services have been wonderful and full of connection), and of course, we will be broadcasting each Sunday for those on the peninsula and beyond.

We are reopening the sanctuary in a limited capacity on **Sunday**, **August 8th for our regular 10:30 service.** We are still working out all the details so please keep watch

We also marked many celebrations, including the end of the school year, 7 wonderful scholarship recipients—high school graduates heading off to college, and a wonderful class of 17 Confirmation students. Thank you SO much to all of our children and youth ministry leaders (Lily Gonzales, Shannon McEntee, Libby Barnard, Dave Olson, Bill Dunbar, Mike Mullery, Julie Berk, and Laura Keating-Clevidence) for a very different but still deeply meaningful year of programming. Thank you also to all of our confirmation mentors (listed below) and parents/families who made that program possible this year, as well as the whole congregation for your ongoing prayers and support!

We have as usual a **special summer program** for our kids and youth. **Elaine Kauffman** has worked hard to develop a curriculum that explores **JOURNEY** as a theme through activities inspired by wonderful children's stories and Bible stories as well. That program began on June 27 on Zoom, and shifts to in-person on **July 11th and 25th, when it will meet during the early outdoor service at 9:00am in the memorial garden.** For youth, we are having a number of outdoor gatherings this summer—including a special in-person retreat for our Confirmation participants! Also, several children and youth from will attend the UCC's Camp Tamarack (Camp Cazadero, which had strong connections to CCSM, is in the process of being sold).

This is a changing and an uncertain time, but our community and connections have held strong. We have found creative ways to engage and in fact have found a number of silver linings: the chance to have kids/youth participate in online programs even when they are traveling (leading to a lot more consistent participation week to week for some!), busy, or away from home, the chance to play and learn about some of our youth's favorite online games (especially Among Us!), the chance to show off our homes, pets, favorite toys, etc. and many more. While we look forward to more in-person programming, we also want to continue to find ways to make the best of what online platforms can offer.

for more communication at the end of July. We want our families with unvaccinated children to feel safe, and are still waiting for the guidelines on singing indoors. We are using an incremental approach in August so the entire congregation can be fully back by homecoming on **Sunday, September 12th.** Our sister UCC congregations in Palo Alto and Berkeley are returning to their sanctuaries in September as well.

As we begin to return in August, and then fully in September, we will be focusing on **REBUILDING COMMUNITY.** We will **celebrate** being together, while **reflecting** on what we've learned from this experience. We will also dedicate time to **grieve** what was lost. We need to be gentle with ourselves as we approach the post-pandemic era. There is no better place to do this than in spiritual community.

Our spiritual community is the center from which we do all ministry and the sanctuary keeps us rooted. We need to be together, see each other, minister to each other, and keep holding on to those who can't be in person for various reasons as well as those who are only able to join online due to location. I will be setting aside some spiritual reflection time at the end of July to prepare my own heart and soul to help lead us through this. In addition, all the staff is doing their best to take some vacation time in July for rest and renewal so we can be strong and offer our best selves in ministry to the congregation.

And so I leave you the words from an old Baptist hymn that entered my heart as I wrote this...

God be with you till we meet again; By His counsels guide, uphold you, With His sheep securely fold you; God be with you till we meet again. Till we meet, till we meet God be with you till we meet again.

So until we meet again, know that you are held in our hearts, and in our prayers, and we hope to see some of you at the outdoor services this month.


## FIRST TUESDAY BOOK GROUP



### A HAPPY UPDATE: DAVID BIOR KUR

Many of you will remember the name David Bior Kur. CCSM, through MSJ, supported him and his cousin Jacob through school in Uganda for a number of years. They had both been orphaned by war as teenagers in South Sudan and Zoe Mullery met them while traveling there in 2007; Lee Mullery was moved by their story to work with MSJ to support them through school. They have both completed college, and Jacob is continuing his studies to be a pharmacist; David has been working for a petroleum company in South Sudan and is doing very well.

In a recent email with Zoe, David described a new business he has created and was full of good news, even in the midst of ongoing catastrophe, floods and famine in South Sudan. He started a money transfer business in 2019, as banking in South Sudan is extremely difficult. After overcoming some obstacles, his business is now running well and has enabled many in the South Suda-



nese diaspora in the US and other countries to send money back to South Sudan more safely, quickly, and easily, for family support, hospital and school bills, and emergencies. David has received a lot of gratitude as getting money to South Sudan has been a real struggle. He has dedicated a percentage of his profits to reinvesting in his community. David wrote a detailed email describing all the steps he had to take to make his business successful, and now he is in the process of celebrating his success by building a 2-bedroom house.

David specifically expressed greetings and gratitude to CCSM: "I am thankful to Madam Lee, Zoe, and Church [CCSM] for the best gift (education) in life. You all struggled to support me, to be someone

better in future. Am always appreciative and praying for God to bless you and keep with me to do same to other people."

## BECOMING A CLIMATE CHURCH

In the words of Rev. Jim Antal, Special Advisor on Climate Justice to the UCC President, "a climate church is a community inspired by the love and justice of Jesus and committed to protect and heal God's glorious gift of creation".

Building on the work we have already done at CCSM to address the climate crisis – such as providing Second Hours, conducting in-person presentations, facilitating discussions with our congregation, and developing our solar energy project that will lower our carbon footprint and deliver clean, renewable electricity to the church – these articles will further explore a variety of climate issues and identify climate actions that we can take as a church community as well as actions members can take in their personal lives.

Underscoring all of our articles in this series will be our Progressive Christian dedication to the concepts of creation care and environmental justice. We care about the natural world and we dedicate ourselves to fighting against pollution and helping preserve the Earth's splendor. At the same time, we recognize the moral and ethical issues that arise in this effort. While we strive to make life sustainable for all people, we recognize that many people - especially poor people and communities of color - have been denied basic environmental rights and we must strive to correct this injustice.

Now, to make this column meaningful, we will look to our CCSM readers for feedback, ideas, and reactions to our articles. ## GOING SOLAR AT CCSM

**CCSM is Going Solar!** The Energy and Environmental Justice Ministry (EEJ) researched and proposed the project in late winter to the Finance Committee and Board of Directors, and both approved the project in early spring. At the 2nd hour All Church Forum on Going Solar held on June 20, we shared details with the congregation and received very positive feedback and thoughtful, valuable comments. Additionally, we saw strong support for climate justice and the solar project depicted in a recent survey, as described very briefly at the end of this article.

In brief, CCSM will be installing photovoltaic panels to generate 41.3 Kw of energy on carport structures in the church parking lot (without any loss of parking spaces), providing 67.5 kWh of energy storage, and installing 2 electric vehicle chargers. The result will be a system that provides adequate electricity to run the church, save significant energy costs and potentially allow us to serve our immediate neighbors with a Resilience Hub in case of emergency. It is one step along the pathway to become a Climate Church. The chosen contractor is Sandbar Electric of Santa Cruz. Jim Granucci is CCSM's liaison on the project. The timeline is to be determined

subject to the permit process with the City of San Mateo, PG&E approval and construction schedule.

The overall capital cost of going Solar is \$300K for which \$95K already has been committed by dedicated CCSM members. A targeted fundraising effort is being launched by a solar Capital Campaign committee. Stay tuned for more details on Going Solar and feel free to contact the Board of Directors or members of EEJ for further information.

Along with researching Going Solar, it has become apparent that CCSM will need to upgrade our infrastructure —namely to replace energy inefficient furnaces and water heaters, to install adequate insulation and to upgrade our energy leaking windows. The details and costs for those infrastructure improvements are being researched now.

EEJ hopes that CCSM will soon become a Climate Church, which is defined as "a Community inspired by the Love and Justice of Jesus and committed to protect and heal

Climate World). A recent survey, completed by more than 250 members and affiliates of CCSM, included five questions regarding climate justice, the solar project, and similar matters. Slightly more than 80% strongly agreed (by marking 8, 9, or 10 on a 10-point scale) that climate change is one of the most important moral and justice issues of our time. About 72% of the respondents strongly agreed (with an 8, 9, or 10) that the proposed solar project for CCSM was a good first step toward becoming carbon neutral. The other three related items in the survey also showed strong support. EEJ is gratified to see such support from the congregation and thanks you for your continuing support.
