Dear beloved community,

This summer will mark my 15th year at CCSM. I feel honored to have served such an amazing congregation for a decade and a half. Together we have embodied our guiding principles and grown



in love and justice each year. I have the greatest confidence in you as a beloved community. So, it is with both deep gratitude and genuine sadness that I am announcing that I am retiring from church ministry.

I have been in pastoral ministry for 27 years and during that time led two congregations through two pandemics. I have loved being a minister through the good times and the challenging times. It is simply time for me to serve in a

I will not be serving another congregation. Please know if I was going to remain in pastoral ministry, it would be with you.

CCSM is approaching its 160-year anniversary and throughout a century and a half, has ALWAYS risen to what the time has required. I feel proud to have been your first woman senior minister, and the longest serving senior minister in the church's history. However, my tenure is less than 10% of that history! Never forget that the strength of CCSM resides in the congregation. You will continue to thrive. While this will be a major change for the church, I ask you to trust your incredible leaders, trust your dedicated staff, and, most of all, trust yourselves.

We will spend the next two months together cherishing our memories and affirming who we are as a spiritual community. Let's celebrate each other even amidst our inevitable tears. I share with you once again, my foundational spiritual principle:

Nothing lasts forever. Nothing is lost forever. So, neither time nor distance can diminish what we have shared or the difference we have made in each other's lives. I will be forever grateful and will carry you in my heart always. Peace,

CHILDREN, YOUTH & FAMILIES

hese past months have been a time of re-building and reconnecting after the Omicron surge had forced us back online for a few weeks. Our programs continue to be vibrant and meaningful, engaging important topics like seasons and rituals, the story of Jesus, Lent, and faith and social justice. Our high schoolers have continued to choose their discussion topics in 60 Minutes and recent conversations have considered school, the pandemic, right wing extremism, and the invasion of Ukraine and the possibility of peace. Our Wednesday programs have also been focused on the seasons, holidays, and art and spirituality. We have also been focusing on building intergenerational connections between the younger and older kids, helping the older ones develop important leadership skills.



One specifically meaningful class took place on March 27, when Elijah and I had a wonderful conversation with the youth about stained glass. We walked around the church and did a "scavenger hunt" to find different symbols in the windows and talked about why they were there and what they might mean. The kids had very creative ideas about the windows at the front of the sanctuary especially, connecting the four seasons of the year to the church seasons, seasons of their lives, seasons of the COVID pandemic, and more. We talked about the symbolism of light shining through glass and the interplay of light, color, and darkness to reveal beauty. Then, the kids created their own stained glass based on symbols, colors, and images that are meaningful to them.

Community service also remains an important component of our programs. We're excited to invite any youth who would like to help make sandwiches to join the CCSM crew in the kitchen on the 4th Sundays of the month at 11:45am. This is a great way to earn community service hours!

In early March we offered a scholarship information session for our 12th graders. We are so grateful to be able to offer scholarships to both our 1st year undergraduate and graduate students due to the generosity of our church. It was wonderful to recon-

YOUR ENERGY, ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE MINISTRY (EEJ) IN ACTION

Here's what's happening with CCSM's Energy, Environmental Justice Ministry (EEJ):

- ☐ The Going Solar permit and plans are under review with the City of San Mateo. Construction will hopefully begin in the next month or so. Stay tuned. When approved and installed, we'll be joining our fellow local faith community, Peninsula Sinai in Foster City to Go Solar with support from Interfaith Power and Light.
- □ Task Force on landscaping and water use. EEJ welcomes volunteers to joint our task force to analyze the impact of our landscaping and plantings on water use and cost both the financial cost of water and the environmental cost of drought reality of California.
- We Love Earth Festival on April 16. CCSM will participate in this Earth Day event at Flood Park in Menlo Park (10 am- 2 pm). We'll have a booth with posters to share what we are doing to become a Climate Church and will provide information and encourage discussion about CCSM in our spiritual life and in our community. We'll have handouts describing our church and handouts of plant-able seed cards encouraging visitors to Nurture the Earth and Nurture Your Spirit at CCSM. Please plan to visit or join the team in the booth to talk about CCSM.
- □ Sermon on Nurturing the Earth and Your Spirit / Creation Care. Rev. Penny Nixon will preach on this important topic. One source of inspiration is the book: Saving Us A Climate Scientist's Case for Hope and Healing in a Divided World, written by Katherine Hayhoe, PhD.
- □ Ribbon Cutting Event: Interfaith Power and Light's ED Liore Milgrom-Gartner asked that we alert our CCSM members of the Community Resiliency Center ribbon cutting event at Hope Methodist Church, South San Francisco on May 1. Hope Methodist has also gone Solar.
- We just hosted a wonderful Second Hour with Rev.

 Fletcher Harper (the Executive Director of GreenFaith, an interfaith environmental coalition), an inspirational activist who presented (with Gary H. White) climate and environmental issues and their relevance and the importance of action from members of faith communities. Check out his book, Green Faith: Mobilizing God's People to Protect the Earth.

One of the best parts of being part of the Posy Posse is the fellowship with like-minded gardeners, floral enthusiasts, and creative folks.




I won't say I learned anything new from this project. There were a few glitches which will be corrected for next year. Mostly, several things were just confirmed.
