#### SENIOR MINISTER SEARCH COMMITTEE SEEKS INPUT

Lastly, the Board of Directors and the Search Committee will be holding Second Hour roundtable discussions on September 18<sup>th</sup> and 25<sup>th</sup> centered around our programming, our budget, and how we hope to move forward. We very much look forward to hearing from you so that we can do our best to get the right Senior Minister for our beloved CCSM community.

# CONTRIBUTE TO CCSM'S NEW BLESSING BOX ON THE FRONT LAWN

The MSJ is proud to support the construction and installation of CCSM's Blessing Box. It is located to the left of the main church entrance on the sidewalk and will serve as a small public food pantry for non-perishable items.



Food insecurity is a very real problem in our city. Since 2019, 40% of those who have visited a food bank requesting assistance are there for the very first time.

If you have any extra non-perishable food items please bring them to church to help stock the Blessing Box. Canned foods, pasta, rice, cereal, granola bars, crackers, etc. all work well. We have noticed that within about a half hour of placing food in the box, it is taken. So clearly there is a need for this!

#### **OPEN CATHEDRAL UPDATE / OPPORTUNITY FOR SERVICE**

As most of you know, the CCSM community has been generously supporting Open Cathedral, run by Night Ministries, for the past 14 years! On the 4th Sunday of every month, volunteers make sandwiches in the CCSM kitchen and deliver them to the Tenderloin, where they are distributed by Night Ministries at their weekly Open Cathedral Sunday services, open to all, and attended primarily by people who live in the streets in San Francisco.

CCSM now has two new co-coordinators of the program, Becky Duffy and Kate Gerwe. Kate will be managing the deliveries and helping out with sandwich making with her high school son Jack, and will also coordinate communications and outreach. Becky will be coordinating the volunteer efforts to ensure that there is a team each month to make the sandwiches. The commitment is about an hour of time after service on a 4th Sunday of the month (or more if you are interested!)

Later in July, she played a concert at St. Bride's in London (pictured here), a concert delayed three years due to a lightning strike and then two years of pandemic.



On Sunday, August 14, an enthusiastic audience enjoyed an organ recital celebrating the 200th birthyear of César Franck, the father of the French Symphonic School of Organ composition! CCSM Organ graduates who have just finished their freshman years as Oberlin organ majors, Chase Olson and Nataly Pak performed followed by Angela Kraft Cross. Chase played Pièce Héroïque and Pastorale then Nataly performed Prelude, Fugue and Variation and Choral 3 before Angela finished with the Grande Pièce Symphonique. Chase shared that Franck's composition Piece Heroique was composed in response to the Franco-Prussian war and he dedicated his performance of the work on Sunday to Prayers for Peace in Ukraine.

'ell..... summer temperatures breaking heat records, wild fires, floods and extended drought are certainly further evidence of the reality of climate change. All highlight the need for more action on environmental issues. One positive note was the recent passage of the Inflation Reduction Bill. Now a federal law, it includes important elements for reducing dependence on fossil fuels, helping utilities move to lower emission sources of energy and encouraging Americans to buy electric vehicles and electric home appliances through tax credits.

GOING SOLAR: At CCSM, we're moving forward on the Going Solar project. The process of getting approval for our project from the City of San Mateo is complex and has been lengthy. EEJ member Jim Granucci reports that we are diligently providing documentation for the project and expect to have a permit issued in October or November. Once approved, the construction can begin.

#### POTENTIAL DROUGHT TOLERANT LANDSCAP-

**ING:** EEJ is gathering information which we expect will result in a recommendation to the CCSM Board and Congregation to modify our church landscaping to be more drought tolerant while keeping functional lawn where appropriate. Jim Schwandt (Building and Grounds and EEJ) is taking the lead in this area (see article below).


#### **GIVING REPORT**

As you are no doubt aware, CCSM gives away its plate offering almost every week to a nonprofit partner in social justice. During the first seven months of 2022, you have given \$69,669 in plate offerings. Thank you so much for your generosity.

However, during the same seven months of 2022, we are running 15% behind the anticipated giving toward the General Budget. Although it is not unusual to fall behind during the summer months, I invite all of you to consider bringing your pledges up to date or giving generously to the General Budget to help pay our clergy and staff and to keep CCSM operating at a highly functional level. Here are the numbers: You have given \$322,042 toward the General Budget – most, but not all of it toward pledges made for the year. This is 85% of the year-to-date budgeted amount of \$379,165. #### **UCC PASTORAL LETTER / TOOLKIT URGES** SUPPORT FOR TRANS, NONBINARY PEOPLE

National and regional leaders of the United Church of Christ issued a pastoral letter June 8, calling on churches to publicly resist a wave of "attacks on people of transgender or nonbinary experience."

Its signers are the UCC's national officers and Conference ministers and the leader of its Open and Affirming Coalition. The letter is posted on the UCC website and it is being distributed widely via the church's Conferences, social media and other networks.

The letter calls on the UCC's "congregations and ministry settings" to respond in word and deed. "We ask you to surround persons of transgender or nonbinary experience and their families and loved ones with compassion and care," the letter said.

The UCC also has a new toolkit of worship, social media and other resources to help local churches welcome and speak out for trans and nonbinary people. The toolkit can be found here.
