amongst many other creative pursuits (special thanks to Elaine!). Our youth often bring homework, college applications, and other projects and it is always a great privilege to support, share, and encourage them while exploring their hopes and dreams for the future. On **Sundays**, we have a variety of engaging programs as well. Our nursery has been bustling as a number of families with pre-school aged children have been coming regularly. Thanks so much to Lily and our youth volunteers for supporting that space and making it so welcoming and joy-filled. Godly Play for our grade-school aged kids continues to explore Bible stories in an open, curious, and wonder-focused way. Kids are encouraged to respond, engage, imagine, and re-create the stories through art, drama, games, and service projects. Our middle schoolers have been having wonderful conversations about science and faith, focused on how the two can intersect, support, and dialogue with one another. We have talked about physics, space, pre-

Parties have been offered for kids (beach parties, cookie making), hobbyists (woodworking, stamp collecting, lapidary), hikers, wine lovers, athletes (tennis, golf, bocce, croquet), poker players, and more.

LAS POSADAS: TO WELCOME IS TO MAKE ROOM

For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me...

—Matthew 25:34

"So... how did your family get here?"

Growing up, I was asked that question so many times. It seemed so odd that people wondered about this, especially because the story was mostly filled with depressing stories my mom and her sisters had to go through crossing the border from Mexico into the United States. They had to face robbers and people waiting to take advantage of them along their vulnerable journey to the north. They were at the mercy of nature and all her threats along the way. They were met by a barricade of people on the border to detain them. My mom and her sisters had to live in fear that they might one day be sent back.

Ever after arriving and making it safely across the border, fear was very much still a presence to my mother and her sisters, mostly of the unknown, of the newness of this country, language, and culture.

Yet, on the other side of that fear, my mother and sisters discovered something beautiful. A community of faithful and kind people, ready to help my mother and her sisters adjust to their new lives. One of the very first things my mom did as she and her sisters settled into their newly-found American lives was reach out to the nearest community center and Catholic parish where they found help. Eventually, when I was old enough to register for public school, the community center and Catholic parish helped her enroll me in the local elementary school and with any other kind of help. These people are the community center and local Catholic Parish, who became a presence to help my mom translate, carpool, suggest, accompany her in any way, and ultimately welcome her. These people were like a built-in family, showing us what radical hospitality looked like. Thank God!

I have seen this lesson on hospitality taught pretty concretely in the tradition of Las Posadas, an event that originated in Mexico that leads up to Christmas. The whole event recounts the experience of Mary and Joseph seeking a place in which to give birth to the Messiah.

At the start of the festivities, half of the participants head outside of the hall or home wherever the event is being held, while the other half remains inside. The group outside represents the Holy Family and asks for lodging by way of a (super catchy!) song. They are refused time and again by the group indoors, and this song persists, with alternating verses between the inside and outside groups. In the final verse, the "outsiders" are finally permitted to enter. Prayer and song continue throughout the night, alongside food and piñatas.


The act of extending a welcome to a group of outsiders through this traditional celebration has confirmed that my faith in Christ means I should have a wholehearted commitment to receiving others. While I don't necessarily live in an age or place where a young family might knock on my door hoping to deliver a baby safely, I do come across people who feel alone, outcast, and afraid. If I can go out of my way to welcome them into my life, heart, and prayers, I am actually welcoming Christ Jesus Himself.

Las Posadas, for me, has always been about reminding me that my faith teaches me that we are all sisters and brothers in Christ and that we are responsible for one another. To welcome each other into our lives, to make room for us to encounter the promises we each hold, is a radical expression of our faith. Even if we won't have the Mother of Jesus knocking on our door any time soon, we are still able to make room for people in our lives and allow our faith in Christ to lead us to live radical hospitality.

I believe Las Posadas encourages us to look for ways to help and support refugee and migrant families detained at the border, and in that way giving them a glimpse of the hope they are searching for.

So join our 9th Las Posadas celebration at CCSM on Wednesday, December 21st at 7:15pm. And, as always the event will end with delicious tamales from my mom's recipe, and with the help of others. Also, this year for the first time we will have Alicia Santamaria lead us in some fun cross-cultural activities in the sanctuary, and hopefully provide prompts for more cross-cultural conversations over tamales. Save the date, put it on your calendar and let's have as many people attend Las Posadas as possible! Peace and blessings!



First Step for Families provides temporary shelter and services for families experiencing homelessness in San Mateo.

In addition, the 17 residents of the Vendome (another LifeMoves program) in downtown San Mateo are chronically homeless adults who will not have much this Christmas. A TIDBIT OF HISTORY FROM THE ARCHIVES OF CCSM

ave you ever wondered why we call our Coffee Hour and social Hall – KLOSS HALL? If you are "new" to the CCSM congregation you might think about this from time to time. And if you are "old" to CCSM you might want a short reminder.

Dr. Charles Luther Kloss was the minister of our church from 1923 until his death in 1931. He began his ministry at CCSM shortly after the opening of the new Church Sanctuary, completed in 1922. It happens that the building which we now call Kloss Hall was that Sanctuary. Between 1923 and 1929, with the leadership of Dr. Kloss, the congregation grew in membership and the Sanctuary became too small to accommodate the growth. So, another sanctuary (our current worship space) was planned, built, and dedicated in 1931. Thus, he was the Minister who served nearly the entire time that the older building was the Sanctuary. In 1931 the current sanctuary opened, and the "old" sanctuary served as the Social Room.

In 1938, under the leadership of Rev. Dr. Sidney Buckham, the Church Council proposed to the congregation that the social room be rededicated to honor Charles Kloss. The congregation approved and a dedication was held in November 1938 to christen the social room as the "Charles Kloss Memorial Social Room." The room underwent a remodeling project that eliminat-

ed the Tilton entrance and established the current stage area and access to the kitchen.

So, if you have an interest in architectural history, take a short walk from the church office to the sidewalk on Tilton and proceed toward Ellsworth Street. Notice the stairs that lead up to a solid wall. That was the entrance to the CCSM Sanctuary from 1922 to 1931. And Dr. Kloss served for almost that entire time.

GREG GRAVES ON THE HISTORY OF THE MUWEKMA OHLONE

A special thank you to Greg Graves for speaking to us about the history of the Muwekma Ohlone, who have belonged to the land here for thousands of years, and who are still here despite centuries of violence and oppression perpetrated against them. Listen to Greg's sermon here.

Greg identified three phases of organized exploitation and attempted extinction of the Indigenous People: the Mission-



aries, the Gold Rush, and the 1850 <u>Act for the Government and Protection of Indians</u>. If you were not able to see the service, do yourself a favor and view it. Hear the history of the victims, not the victors. Below are two articles to continue the education that we did not receive in school about the Native American genocide.

"Indigenous people have often been erased from the country's historical record – a survey from the National Congress of American Indians found that 87% of state history standards don't mention Native American history after 1900, while 27 states don't mention Native Americans in their K-12 curriculum." (Click <u>HERE</u> to read "What Indigenous Peoples' Day Means to Native Americans.")

Historians say the 1863 Bear River Massacre left at least 350 Northwestern Shoshone Indians dead. But it was overshadowed by the Civil War and remains mostly forgotten. (Click <u>HERE</u> to read "This was the worst slaughter of Native Americans in U.S. history. Few remember it.")

As Christians called to love all our neighbors, we need to be intentional in our edification and deconstruct the white-washed history to begin conversations around apologies and healing.
