as linear feelings and emotions to move through but as simultaneous occurrences in which we engage to make meaning from our losses. These are the days to process and lament, to accept and commemorate.

On Sunday, February 26th, 2023, the Congregational Church of San Mateo released Rev. Jorge P. Bautista from his ministerial covenant with CCSM. Another sad day as beloved clergy steps away from CCSM. We become acutely aware 'they' are not ours to keep. God works in

has started off strong for our children and youth programs! Our attendance has been strong on both Wednesdays and Sundays and it has been so wonderful to keep up the momentum we built over the Advent season. On Sunday, January 8 we had a wonderful family play date with lunch after church where we decorated pillowcases for kids in LifeMoves Family Shelters. We had a good conversation about why kids might need a shelter and what messages we would like to share. Families enjoyed connecting with one another and one brand new family who attended that day for the first time even stayed to connect. During that time we also brainstormed hopes and dreams for our family programming this year as a church.

On Wednesdays, we have continued to have a wonderful group of kids and youth with us each week. Our activities have ranged with the various age levels but they have included reading some wonderful children's books about nature, creating our own books, painting, drawing, games, and more. Our youth continue to bring homework and enjoy games and conversation as well.



On Sundays our Godly Play group has been very strong for our multi-age K-5th grade group. Kids continue to amaze me with their insightful reflections on Bible stories and the meaning they see in these

ancient texts. We have also brought in some contemporary story books that align with the Biblical stories and the connections that the kids draw are amazing! Our preschool contingent continues to be large as well.

The middle school youth class has also been growing. Our theme this season is "parables and play" where we have reflected on the meaning of parables from the Bible, other religions, and also the "lessons" in board games. A lot of our youth enjoy var-

ious kinds of games and it has been great to have them bring in some of their favorites to share



together. Lots of interesting conversations have been had about the thngs we can learn about life from board games including: relationships are more important than who wins, some parts of success are related to skill but other parts are about luck, distraction can prevent us from reaching our goals,

and, when playing a cooperative game, each person brings a different gift to the game just as they do to the world. I am always impressed by the meaning they find, and



also the connections they draw to religious parables. We have also had good conversations about parables more broadly and why humans respond well to stories (and perhaps less well to rules!).

Our highschoolers continue to enjoy gathering for **60 Minutes.** In January we had a group of 11 discuss the future of the church. They offered a lot of interesting insights about the ways that churches are changing and ours specifically, and even brainstormed characteristics they would like to see in our new Senior Minister such as being a good listener, open to diversity, and willing to change and evolve with the church. Our discussion in February, chosen by the youth as always, will be about schooling, religion and education, and online vs. in person classes. Should be great!

For our highschoolers on both Wednesday and Sunday we are working to create a **youth peer leadership team.** This group will work to plan events, promote, and facilitate what we do together. This will be also a great leadership opportunity that can help to build skills and that youth can put on their college applications, resumes, etc. If you are interested, there is still time to join! A special event in January was the Martin Luther King Jr. Multifaith Day of Service. Although the rains were heavy and caused a lot of park closures, CCSM folks of all ages enjoyed singing for seniors, sorting donated books, and doing some park clean up work. It was a great day and there are dozens of projects each year for people of all ages. Please mark your calendar and plan to participate in 2024 whether or not you have kids!

many ways for many reasons, yet unknown. In a recent The Daily podcast, I heard, Rev. Kevin Thompson say, "People always say thing happens for a reason, but they are wrong. Things happen for a thousand reasons." Rev. Thompson was clergy leaving his church community.

Sunday's worship service was evidence of the Tasks of Grief in action. The process of planning the service and attending the service informs the reality of acceptance; commemoration was a powerful closure and a milestone to reflect our gratitude for the relationships and sustain the memories created. Commemoration helps us process the time we had together, helping us to make meaning for how to move forward in the days ahead.

Grief is not easy. Based on our prior experiences with loss and change, we will all process it differently. Time and space, grace and mercy are the ingredients for healing. When we are ready, we will be able to see beyond the moments of hurt and loss. Changes will begin to move forward with our outreach and ministries. Every experience is an opportunity to shape our lives into a more meaningful, purposeful existence. Treating every day as a day to grow into our best selves is God acting within us and bringing our soul into the light it is meant to share.

It is my privilege to walk beside you and hold hope as your grief changes to resolve and passion to carry the torch of God's love for and through CCSM.

Much like Rev. Penny, Rev. Jorge will be gone but never forgotten. We keep them in our hearts and prayers for their continued ministries to touch the lives of those whose paths cross. May their service continue to grow in faith and actions.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR MODERATOR

have been learning a lot from all of you, and I want to emphasize that building a closer connection with the board is a top priority. We acknowledge that we have made mistakes with communication and the rollout of the 2023 budget, and we are deeply sorry for any pain this may have caused. Moving forward, we want to improve our communication and rebuild trust with the congregation.

To clarify, while the 2023 budget has been approved, it still reflects a \$117,000 deficit, and more hard decisions may need to be made. The Board is facing a challenge of communicating our vision for the future while honoring the beloved staff who are still here and those who have been affected by the budget changes.

At our recent Board of Directors meeting in February, we discussed ways to repair relations and build trust with the congregation. We are currently working



on several initiatives to accomplish this, including providing more regular financial updates, making budget updates available in the Pine Tree, and sharing BOD minutes through links in the Pine Tree. We also want to remind the congregation that both the BOD and Finance Committee meetings are open to anyone who wishes to attend.

Additionally, we are in discussions about partnering with the Spiritual Life Ministry to facilitate healing conversations with the congregation. This will provide a spiritual context and a safe space for the process of healing and reconciliation to begin. We have tentatively scheduled this conversation for March 19th after church.

We are heartened by the fact that there are 17 first-time pledgers in 2023, and 58 members increased their pledges. Thanks to Carol Henton, Martha Bronitsky, and Jim Lindsay's outreach, 20 members pledged since the budget meeting. Our stewardship totals are currently \$525,296. However, we are also saddened to report that five people have left CCSM since the budget announcement. This is expected during times of transition and when budgets are strained.

We ask that you keep an open mind and view our communications as coming from the heart, with the utmost care. The hard work we are doing now will set us up for a successful tenure for the next senior minister and will allow us to attract the next generation of CCSMers who will benefit from this amazing community, where our souls are healed and nourished so we can do good in the world.


REV. SHERYL JUST PUBLISHED A BOOK!

JANUARY 2023 FINANCIAL SUMMARY

In an effort to provide more financial information to all members of CCSM, we are providing a financial summary on a regular basis. We invite your comments about this report and whether more information or less information would be helpful.



This report is based on revenue and expenses for the first month of 2023. We are reporting both for the month and for the year-to-date (YTD), which means January 2023 through the current month. Obviously, those are the same for January, but will be more important as the year progresses. Here is the summary for January 2023:

Comments:

1. Some donors paid their entire 2023 pledge in a prior year. The donations reported above include all donations made in 2023 and a pro-rated portion of the 2023 pledge payments made in 2022.

2. Bear in mind that even with the staff reductions that were so painful to implement, our budget for 2023 has a shortfall (expenses exceed revenue) of \$117,000.

LATINO/A MINISTRY UPDATE

As our church community continues to grapple with the impact of our fiscal challenges and recent budget decisions, we are providing this detailed updated to ensure open communication, transparency, understanding, and continued compassion for us all.


After Rev. Jorge Bautista announced his resignation in both the Wednesday and Sunday services two weeks ago our Latino/a Ministry Planning Team met together to process, lament, and talk honestly about the impact of this news. Our Planning Team consists of eight members from our English-speaking congregants (Jeff Chandler, Kathy Gallo, Stephen Held, Lauren Mathews, Silvana Quintanilla, Pablo Quintanilla, Alicia Santamaria, and Julien Phillips) and eight members from our Spanish-speaking congregants (Oscar Acuna, Elvia Delgado, Reina Gonzales, Rosa E. Hernandez, Jose Angel Hernandez, Cruz Lopez, Manuel Lopez, and Otilia Rodriguez).

We had a long, candid, emotional, and loving conversation. Our Wednesday congregants spoke gratefully about the welcome they felt at CCSM, the inclusiveness and respect as equals, and the generosity of resources. They spoke about how much their children have appreciated participating in the children and youth activities during the Wednesday services, as well as the invitation to be part of Sunday school and Joyful Noise.

They shared how much they value CCSM's commitment to social justice for marginalized people, both the outreach and support for the local North Central neighborhood and as far away as the border. They expressed great respect and love for Rev. Jorge, and deep gratitude for all he had done for them as pastor, as counselor and as advocate on immigration and many other needs, and as encourager for them in expressing their own voice in local housing and other issues. They also expressed great sadness at losing Rev. Jorge, dismay about the budgetary decisions that precipitated his resignation, and concern that they had not had prior knowledge about the big decisions being made.

Our Sunday Team members expressed love and sympathy for our Wednesday brothers and sisters, and our own great sadness at losing Rev. Jorge. We mentioned ways in which our whole CCSM community is enriched with their participation, noting especially the value for our children and youth. We regretted that efforts to strengthen leadership development and relationship-building between Wednesday and Sunday congregants, stalled by the pandemic, had only recently re-started. We assured them that even though CCSM is going through a difficult period, the church remains committed to our Latino/a Ministry, our aspiration to be inclusive and to work actively for social justice remains strong, and we expect the energy and joy to return.

In summary, we communicated that the CCSM budget provides for continued commitment, and



that CCSM hoped our Spanish-speaking congregants would continue at CCSM. Although our deepest desire was to continue to work with them to sustain and build our Latino/a Ministry into the future, we acknowledged that only they could choose what they feel is best for them.

They indicated that they would like some time to think, pray, and consult with each other, and that they would let us know the outcome of their deliberations within two weeks. We concluded the meeting with expressions of respect and caring for each other, and with abrazos. Subsequently we let them know that we would work to create a contingency plan to keep Wednesday services going with guest pastors through March.

Two weeks later the leaders of our Spanish-speaking congregants met with Alicia and Julien, and they informed us that they had decided not to continue worshipping at CCSM. "Our decision was very, very difficult," said Reina Gonzales. "The church welcomed us and supported us. Jorge and Penny embraced us with such love, and there are many good people in the church. We are proud of the community we built here. But the budget decisions were a shock. Without Jorge, we just couldn't continue."

We assured them that they would remain in our hearts and that CCSM would welcome them back any time. And we encouraged their children to continue involvement in CCSM's children and youth activities.

For our Latino/a Ministry, this is a time of great sadness. It is also a time to appreciate CCSM's investment over years and honor what it took to build this robust Spanish-speaking congregation within CCSM, to honor the range of emotions and grief that people are feeling, to seek to learn from this journey, and ultimately to center ourselves in hope.

Over time we pray for new opportunities to offer a progressive Christian option for Spanish-speakers in our community, build relationships with our North Central neighbors, and work in solidarity with them and others toward greater inclusion and social justice in San Mateo.

UPDATE FROM THE DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS

As most folks know, our beautiful facility has been posted on a site called Peer Space, which is a rental site for venues like Airbnb, since August 2022. We have been very successful renting out rooms for a variety of events, such as birthdays, gender reveal parties, baby showers, corporate events, etc. Using



this platform is allowing the facility to generate income, which contributes to reducing the budget deficit.

What this means is that if you are hosting a CCSM-related event, you may need to share the space, including parking, with people who are paying top dollar to host their own parties. When scheduling, I try very hard to avoid any potential overlap that will impact CCSM events. And I ask that CCSM members keep in mind that it may require some flexibility on our part to ensure those paying guests feel welcome and free to enjoy the space.

Please remember that CCSM has a contract with the renters. If you have an issue with noise or anything else, please do not deal directly with our guests, but instead contact Chase at 650-533-4385 or let Oscar know and he will call me. I will be happy to mediate any concerns. Each party has an opportunity to post an online review, and we want to ensure that our comments are favorable. And of course, I want to be sure that CCSM members are able to use their facility in comfort. So please let me know if you have any questions.

In other news, there will be a planned power outage at the end of April for several days as work begins on the

Solar Project. This will impact the two schools, as well as Oscar and his family, who will need to relocate during the outage. We will begin emptying the fridge and freezer in the beginning of April. If you have any space in your freezer in your garage, we may call on you to share a little space. More on this as details emerge.

We are aware of the on-going leak in the Candle Room at the back of the sanctuary. Oscar will continue to work to seal up any remaining leaks as the roof and stairs dry out.

Please don't forget to check the front desk if you are expecting someone to leave something there for you. We sometimes have quite a build-up of envelopes and packages. The Office Volunteers will be grateful.

It is an honor to maintain this wonderful campus. If you notice an area we should focus on, please do not hesitate to let me know.


Everything) by Sarah Stewart Holland and Beth Silver can help us become careful listeners, show mutual respect, and develop a deeper understanding of the Other.

SEARCH COMMITTEE UPDATE

As was announced at the Jan 8 service, the Senior Minister position has been posted on the UCC website, and we have begun to receive applications.

Many of you may not realize that we work with our regional UCC Conference to post the position and receive applications. The Search Committee had to complete a UCC church profile template that in addition to church and community data included several long answer questions. What we wrote was guided by the survey, interview, and round table input we gathered in the fall, and we produced a hefty document (40ish pages). Meanwhile, candidates post their individual profiles with the UCC (20ish pages) and direct them to be sent to job openings that appeal to them. Our regional UCC liaison sends us the profiles in batches.



To help get the word out we are posting the position with seminaries and publications that are aligned theologically with our core values and pushing the posting to selected churches that also share our progressive vision. All candidates - regardless of how they hear about the position - will submit their profiles through the UCC system.

For those who are interested in the Search Committee's vetting process, here's a gloss of the first phase of our screening process:

- □ Initial Screen: all committee members read each profile and fill out an evaluation. We discuss these as a team and together decide whether to proceed with each candidate.
- 2nd Screen: Candidates who passed the initial screen are asked for a letter of interest, and the team watches sermons, does some internet searches and checks social media. These findings are discussed (again with a rubric to help ground us), and the next go/no go decision is made.
- □ Virtual Interview(s): this is an opportunity to understand candidates on a more personal level. We use a mix of standard questions and particular inquiries to address any issues that have arisen in the previous screening steps.

As we move into the more advanced phase of the search, we will keep you apprised of how we are making decisions and how we will eventually involve the congregation.

Meanwhile, some of you have wondered what the job posting looks like. Rather than inflicting 40 pages on you, we want to share the 2-page core job description. Its origins are in the document that had guided the Board's relationship with Penny, and we have revised it to reflect what we heard in September – particularly around growth, families, and collaboration. We remain deeply honored to have your trust and confidence as we pursue this search. We know that somewhere there is a great match for CCSM!
