

CHILDREN, YOUTH & FAMILIES

Our children and youth programs continue to build momentum and have good energy. I am so grateful for the leadership of Kim Rey and Troy Grabow who have been very helpful in offering a great deal of assistance, including sending out a survey to families to get input on the timing and



types of programs families are looking for right now. I am also so grateful to the many volunteers who especially pitched in to help with our Easter kids' programming including Heather Nayak, Michele Cinq Mars and Nicole Tocchini. I am also so grateful to

our wonderful CYF staff: Elaine Kauffman, Lily Gonzales, Shannon McEntee, and Elijah Barnard who have stepped up especially in this time when I have been more involved in worship leadership.

Our Sunday kids' programs have continued to include our preschool free



play program, K-5th grade Godly Play class, middle school youth discussion, and monthly "6o Minutes" discussion for highschool students. In Godly Play, Shannon tells a Bible story and then leads the kids to reflect on a number of questions to connect the story to their lives and to examine what is important to them about the story and what they imagine it to mean. Elaine then connects the story to a theme and helps the kids to engage in that theme through

contemporary storybooks, art, service projects, and more.



Our middle school program has been focused on parables and play. As several of our middle schoolers enjoy board games, we thought it would be fun to bring in those games and talk about what the games can teach us about ourselves, working with others, and issues in our world. Those are "parables" in and of themselves, but

we've also been connecting the themes from the games to Biblical parables as well as parables from other sacred texts and faith traditions. It's been

a very interesting time and the youth have shared a lot of deep insights both from the games themselves as well as what we can learn from how we play them - competition, collaboration, not giving up too soon, how to win/ lose well, what real-



ly matters when we play games, etc.

Our highschool youth have continued to discuss important issues in our world including top stories



from the news, events going on at our church, and youth mental health. I am so grateful

to Mike Mullery for his continued leadership in this group for over 20 years!

For families, we also continue to hold a monthly lunch and activity after church on the first Sunday

of the month. This has been a lovely time to get to know one another better. Our activities have included playing board games, decorating pillowcases for a LifeMoves family shelter, decorating lunch bags and writing notes of encouragement for those participating in free meal programs, singing and music, and much more. For youth, we have also been preparing several highschoolers for Confirmation! We went to Foothills UCC to meet their youth and learn about confirmation - it was a wonderful conversation and time of fellowship. The youth created their own worship service and also helped to lead worship that Sunday at Orinda. On Wednesdays, it has been a blessing to have our children and vouth

I am also delighted to share that the Peninsula Multifaith Coalition has re-launched their youth program with youth from various communities coming together to plan and execute events to learn more about one another's faith traditions. Our next event will be a park/beach clean up and BBQ in late April. This is a great chance for youth to practice their leadership skills and build diverse community to serve the common good. committees, help behind the scenes—truly I have experienced such an outpouring of support and love during this time and I want to express deep and sincere gratitude to everyone.

Still, as we move into the season of Easter, I know that questions remain. We continue to search for a new senior minister. We continue to explore questions of what a Latinx ministry might look like in this season. We continue to ask many questions about where we have been and where we are going. But we have the promise that new life is coming and we have the call to be part of making it so.

As we look into the coming weeks and months, we have a lot that is showing us signs of hope and new life. Our series over this season will be "Rise Up, Take Heart" which is loosely based on a message we find in the book of Ezra in the Hebrew Bible. This book of the Bible describes the period after Babylonian captivity, when the temple in Jerusalem is re-built. It is important to say that different Biblical understandings of "rising up" exist and those in the

Hebrew Bible are complete unto themselves for our siblings in the Jewish community (it is important not to read the Hebrew Bible as simply preparation for the Christian scriptures). Yet we know that "rising up" is also a message that shares deep resonance with our Easter theme of resurrection.



Today, we might find ourselves rising up from winter, from despair, from the pandemic, from the rains, and much more. And we might also rise up to what is coming next for us individually and collectively. And when we rise, we do it with heart. We bring our feelings, our pain, our care and our love. And we can take heart in the fact that we have a new day and this new season before us. Our story is not over. We have one another and we have a promise that God will be with us in this new season.





MARCH 2023 FINANCIAL SUMMARY

April 11, 2023

In an effort to provide more financial information to all members of CCSM, we are providing a financial summary on a regular basis. We invite your comments about this report and whether more information or less information would be helpful.

This report is based on revenue and expenses for the first three months of 2023. We are reporting both for the month and for the year-to-date (YTD), which means January through March 2023 in this report.

Comments:

- 1. Several unusual expenses in March account for the high expenses that month.
 - a. The annual payments for insurance, workers compensation, and property taxes totaled \$32,452.
 - b. Expenses associated with the resignation of our interim minister totaled \$30,097.
 - c. Our quarterly contribution to the UCC conference was \$5,000.
 - d. These three items totaled \$67,549 in expenses for the month of March 2023.
- 2. Bear in mind that even with the staff reductions that were so painful to implement, our budget for 2023 has a shortfall (expenses exceed revenue) of \$117,000.

LATINO/A MINISTRY UPDATE

In the previous issue of the *Pine Tree* I reported that our Spanish-speaking congregants had decided to withdraw from CCSM, hurt by the events that culminated in the resignation of Rev. Jorge Bautista, their beloved pastor. In this issue I am reporting that they are back worshipping with us at CCSM.

After several weeks away they were feeling very sad about the loss of their Wednesday gatherings. Moreover, they were deeply moved by the outpouring of love and support for Rev. Jorge at his farewell fiesta, and they took note of all the ways that our CCSM community expressed how much we valued our relationships with them and their place in our community.

We offered to arrange for a Spanish-speaking pastor to lead a Wednesday gathering in which they could worship and celebrate communion together again, share a meal, and have a discussion with several of us 'Sunday folks.' They gratefully accepted. David Vásquez-Levy, President of Pacific School of Religion, agreed to lead worship and communion, and also to facilitate and translate for the discussion. Two of CCSM's board members participated along with the co-chairs of our senior-minister search committee and one of its members, and one Sunday person who wanted simply to demonstrate how much she valued the 'Wednesday folks' in our congregation.

Several of us commented that it felt like one of the most meaningful services we had participated in for a long time. Although the service was primarily in Spanish, Rev. David summarized enough in English that everyone could engage fully. The sense of community among worshipping Christians seemed especially strong, the music led by Melanie Dresbach and her son Richie drew us into active participation, and Rev. David's spirit shined throughout the service.

In the discussion that followed the Spanish-speak-

ing folks expressed how good they felt to be back in their home in the Fireplace Room and at CCSM. Search-committee leaders invited them to play an active role in meeting with candidates and giving their feedback. A message from



Chris Wuthmann offered to hold a Spanish-language healing and reconciliation gathering. I offered to try to arrange weekly Wednesday gatherings at least through May with Spanish-speaking pastors. After discussion they indicated that they would like to return to CCSM at least during this period, participating in regular Wednesday gatherings and expressing their concerns and hopes as all of us work together to shape CCSM's future.

Since then we have been able to arrange for Spanish-speaking pastors to lead weekly worship services and communion through the end of May (except for one Wednesday devoted to the Spanish-language healing and reconciliation session, which David Vásquez-Levy has agreed to facilitate and translate). Our Spanish-speaking brothers and sisters encourage English-speaking congregants to participate with them in the Wednesday gatherings, and the pastors have agreed to translate enough into English to enable non-Spanish speakers to engage as well. Several of our Spanish-speaking families have also participated in CCSM's Sunday services, and it has been terrific to see English-speaking congregants chatting with them during coffee hour.

Michele Moffitt has relocated permanently to Pennsylvania to be close to family. She has had multiple health problems in the last several months and her niece, Mary O'Neil, is quite supportive. Michele is staying with her niece until she finds an Assisted Living that is a good fit.




THE CCSM GOING SOLAR PROJECT IS UNDERWAY!

Meanwhile, the permanent search team charged ahead with such success that new permanent minister could arrive just a few months from now. No professional interim wanted to pretend to do "interim work" within such a limited timeframe. What a stalemate!

In this in-between time, our task is to be the most vibrant, organized, and spirit-filled church possible by the time the new minister arrives. Rev. Dr. Sheryl

Johnson jumped in to lead our worship services, provide pastoral care, and manage all the logistics of keeping church communication rolling—all while continuing to lead the children and youth program. Rev. Dr. Kibbie Ruth, a regular at CCSM, has agreed to partner with her as somewhat of a pseudo-interim minister. As Transitional Minister, Kibbie will engage with the lay leadership to help the congregation heal from past wounds, increase the sense of community and participation, and prepare for a settled senior minister. That includes working with the Council of Ministries, Board and Finance Committee in matters like process, protocol, and resources, refining the church mission and governance structure, and working toward financial stability.

Kibbie and Sheryl cannot prep for the coming pastor alone. They need YOU! Please join the energized leaders and volunteers in helping CCSM shine before our new minister comes. Together, with God's help, we can live into our Guiding Principles so authentically that the new pastor can start ministry here moving forward, rather than inheriting any of our stale baggage.
