It was a lovely collaborative effort amongst the older kids! In November, Ivan and Natalia's family hosted a playground gathering after church in Burlingame. Thank

Thank you also to Troy Grabow and Kim Rey for chairing our CYF Ministry Team. We've had great conversations and planned many meaningful programs together. I am so grateful for their leadership and all who serve on the team and support in various ways.

On Saturday, September 30 CCSM had a booth at the San Mateo Fall Fest! We had some fun giveaways for kids and had a number of families (and adults without kids too!) stop by to learn more about the church. We offered some information about upcoming events and shared some basics about progressive Christianity—something that was new to many folks! On Halloween, Revs. Alvaro, Jessica, and I handed out candy (and flyers with upcoming church activities) to folks in the neighborhood at the church (thank you, Sue and Rosemarie, for all of the candy!). It was a great chance again to connect more with both English and Spanish speakers in the local com-

munity.

Another special event was our children's Día de los Muertos celebration. The kids learned about the holiday and made papel picado (colorful cut tissue paper flags) and other crafts to decorate the altar. We had two adults (Pablo and Reina) from our church with Mexican heritage share about the meaning of the holiday and their experiences of celebrating it, particularly from when they were children. The kids enjoyed a wonderful face painter, created paper marigold flowers (thank you, Lauren and Ashley!), decorated sugar skulls, read beautiful children's books (thank you Elaine!), watched the movie Coco, ate popcorn (thank you Jim!), and remembered

loved ones who had died. A very special word of thanks to Alicia, Santi, and Reina who put so much love into this event and took the lead on the altar creation. We had so many kids we had to keep adding more chairs as the morning progressed. It was meaningful to see kids and families from Wednesday and Sunday building community together.

Our highschool youth continue to gather for 60 Minutes (thank you to Michele and Mike for all you do to support!). This is a wonderful program where our youth decide together what they would like to discuss each month. In many ways this is the basis for our new Peer Leadership Team, where youth not only plan their discussion topics but other events for themselves, kids at church, and the wider church community. I am so excited to be building this great team of 10-12th graders and to be helping them to develop their own leadership skills to plan, promote, and implement events that they discern would be a ministry to their peers and others.

This is a similar approach being used by the Peninsula Multifaith Coalition's Youth Program. We are blessed to have a very diverse group of youth from



our local faith communities who have come together to learn about one another's faith traditions and serve the community. CCSM recently hosted a planning meeting and organized a community fun afternoon for youth to play games, get to know one another, and share about youth experiences in different faith traditions.

A new program we are excited to be launching is called Disciples and Dragons. If you are familiar with Dungeons and Dragons or D&D (a role playing game) you will know the approach and overall style—but this curriculum explores Biblical stories. It was created by an Episcopal priest who wanted to help youth explore the Bible and learn about progressive Christianity through the format of a role playing game. One of our youth is a big fan of D&D and we hope to get this started soon; please let Sheryl know if you have experience with D&D!

Looking ahead to Advent, we have lots on the horizon. Our youth leaders are planning a caroling afternoon on Dec 3 where we will sing Christmas carols at the homes of some of our members who are not able to get out to church. On Dec 3 during the service, youth will help the kids practice carols and make holiday crafts for seniors. If you know of someone who might appreciate a caroling visit (or are such a person yourself!), please let Sheryl know - we might not be able to visit everyone but would love to spread joy





### FROM THE ARCHIVES... TWO HISTORIC STAINED-GLASS WINDOWS

As you gaze around the sanctuary during a Sunday Service, you might notice the seven small crossshaped stained glass windows along the pews on the lower level. (There is also one in the Narthex.) Each window is a memorial to a former member or relative of a member. They are dated variously during the 1940's and 1950's. Two in particular lend themselves to a Pine Tree Article as they are veterans from World War II and we remember them during this Veterans Day period.

On the Tilton Street side of the sanctuary is a window with a plate reading "In loving memory of Bernarr H Nelson, Born September 16, 1919, Missing in Action June 22, 1943." Next to it is another window with a plate reading "In loving memory of Robert Henry Lupton, Born July 7, 1924, Missing in Action January 9, 1945."

Both of these men were members of Bombardment groups during World War II.

Bernarr Nelson was a First Lieutenant in the 547 Bombardment Squadron, part of the 384th

Bombardment Group. The European Theater of War.

Squadron saw action in the



His unit flew B-17 bombers and operated from an airbase in Greenock, Scotland. On its first combat mission, June 22, 1943, Lt Nelson's plane was shot down over the English Channel. Three of the crew survived but he and six other mates did not. A lieutenant on a B-17 would be a pilot, co-pilot, navigator, or 1st bombardier.

Robert Henry Lupton enlisted in the Army Air Corps in 1943 at the age of 18. Sgt Lupton was a member of the 877th Bombardment Squadron and was attached to the 499th Bombardment Group. They saw action in the Pacific Theater of War and operated from Saipan. The 877th flew mainly B-29 bombers and participated the Battles of Iwo Jima, Truk, and the Mariana Islands. His plane went down January 9, 1945 when his squadron participated in raids on Kyushu in support of the advance on Okinawa. He is memorialized at the National Cemetery in Honolulu, Hawaii. A Sergeant on a B-29 would be a radio operator, a gunner or a maintenance engineer.

These men have been honored in memorial

windows at CCSM for 80 years. We thank them for their service and their sacrifice.






**Friday, November 17** we'll gather at noon in the Buckham Room to enjoy our BYOL (lunch). Beverages and dessert are provided. Following a

## NOTES FROM YOUR DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS

I am so thrilled to welcome Rev. Jessica to her new role as Senior Pastor here at CCSM. What a joy Jessica is to work with! She has been with us less than one month, and her vibrancy and enthusiasm were apparent from Day One. Her easy laughter can

be heard often. And speaking for myself, laughter and joy are just what I need. I am impressed by how quickly she is getting oriented to all the people, committees, events, processes and history of CCSM. I look forward to learning from Rev. Jessica and serving her as she leads the congregation into a new season.

Here's a bit of news! The church is back up on the Peer Space platform. Peer Space is like an Airbnb for venues. Brian Mathews, at the request of the Board, was very instrumental in initially helping launch Peer Space back in August 2022. From August through May 2023, we were very successful, renting out various rooms to about 18 renters, including corporate meetings and events, as well as private parties. But managing what was essentially a small business 24/7 required finding a volunteer to assist with the volume of inquiries, emails, bookings and tours. In August, Sean Moran responded to the call and we began to work together to get our listings back up and running again. We have been "live" again now for one week, and we already have two bookings for Kloss Hall. The hope is that by renting out space in the church, we can generate income to help balance the budget. Of course, we have always rented to outside renters, such as the San Francisco Boys Chorus, Masterworks, numerous 12-step groups and community partners. But with the exposure on Peer Space, we can reach a wider market and hopefully, increase the volume of rentals.

The goal is to increase rentals while ensuring that the facilities remain available to the church members themselves. One way you can help accomplish that goal is to look ahead and submit your booking requests as early as possible. I also ask that if you observe anything that is of concern, that you report your concerns directly to me. There is a form in the Main Office that should be completed, so all the details can be documented and I can follow up and resolve any concerns you may have. A big thank you to Sean Moran, and also to Oscar Rosa who provides custodial services, and is on site during off hour events. Together, all of us, including the members, can contribute to making

Peer Space a financial success.

The Board is looking for long-term renters for the second floor of the Woodward (CE) Building. As we move forward with this venture, we will take great care to find just the right renters, who will be respectful and flexible regarding the church's ongoing needs for the space. If you have any suggestions as to potential prospects, please let me know!

This past week, the **Tree of Life windows** were evaluated and one area was resealed where there was some slippage in the applied image. We were reassured that this area of repair will last another 30 years. The **gate in the Memorial Garden** was also recently repaired where the wood had weathered and split. Jim Schwandt and I are pursuing a replacement for the **elderly furnace** that serves the sanctuary. Multiple estimates will be obtained in the coming months for review by the Finance Committee.

As we enter the Advent season, there will be many wonderful opportunities to gather together and share in our community. Busy times highlight the need for us to offer each other grace. If something gets missed or is not 100% as you had planned, let's remember it was not intentional. We are called to extend each other extravagant understanding and kindness always, but especially during this season.

Please let me know how I can help you make your Advent event special. The staff is here to support the life of the church!



### **BECOMING A CREATION JUSTICE CHURCH**



A key goal of the Environmental Justice Ministry is for CCSM to achieve official UCC recognition as a Creation Justice Church. The intent of UCC's Creation Justice Church program is to ensure that the work of the ministry of environmental justice becomes an integral strand in the DNA of our faith community. But, in order to achieve this honored status, we collectively have some work to do. According to UCC policy, a congregation can only be officially designated as a Creation Justice Church if it completes five specific steps and documents its achievement in an application.

THE FIRST STEP IS CREATING A "GREEN TEAM" that drives environmental justice issues and initiates climate actions within the church. With the creation of the Environmental Justice Ministry back in 2017 and the ongoing work of the ministry, CCSM can check this box.

THE SECOND REQUIRED STEP IS REFLECTING ON WHERE WE'VE BEEN AND DISCERNING WHERE WE CAN GO WITH OUR ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE EFFORTS. The EJ Ministry will need to identify

the strengths of our ministry that have led us to this point. With this as a foundation, we must then actively institute the "Four Dimensions of a Creation Justice Church." They are: a) bringing a theological understanding of creation care into worship services. b) integrating creation care into the life and work of the governing council and other ministries. c) researching issues of race and economic inequality and mapping learnings to congregational advocacy and action, and d) connecting with other local groups engaged in environmental justice to effect change in the local community.

The third required step is drafting a creation justice covenant. A covenant marks a sacred promise to God and entails a promise among congregants to each other to walk together in addressing environmental justice in the church and the larger community. Fourth, the creation justice covenant then needs ratifying by the church governing body and the congregation. And finally, the fifth step is to complete and submit an application to UCC documenting the steps taken and requesting official status as a Creation Justice Church.


We look forward to everyone's participation in CCSM's journey to achieve UCC recognition as a Creation Justice church in the near future.

# TREASURER'S REPORT

This is the latest installment of our continuing series providing the congregation a financial summary on a regular basis. Many of you will recall that the budget for 2023 approved by the congregation last January included a shortfall of nearly \$117,000. Expenses were then projected at \$933,329 and revenue at \$816,514. Yes, that's a large shortfall, but fortunately we have ended most prior years in the past decade with revenue exceeding expenses and have \$132,000 in the bank that will more than cover that shortfall. Furthermore, we continue to project a smaller shortfall of \$80,000 by year's end. This arises from a few generous gifts to the General Fund that were not planned as well as some designated funds that were released for the General Fund.

The Finance Committee has held several open meetings to discuss the 2024 budget and the Board will hold a discussion of the 2024 budget following

worship on November 19 in Kloss Hall. A light meal will be served for all who participate. Come join us!

Finally, we provide below a brief overview of revenue and expenses through October. We report both for the month and for year-to-date (YTD), which means the total for January through October.



Detailed reports have been provided to the Board and are available to members upon request.

The Board is planning to review the budget with the congregation on **Thursday, December 14, at 7:00 pm in Kloss Hall.** All are encouraged to attend. Another date for your calendar!

### TONY GALLO: RED RIDER



ver forty years ago, I developed type 2 diabetes, and I thought I had it under control. But a few months ago my doctor told me I had chronic kidney disease. My mom died of this diabetes complication when she was my age, and that really got me thinking. I guess my way of making lemonade with the lemons that I got from this news was to get involved with this fundraising ride.

I started raising money for it in July and was amazed at how many people supported my efforts. Over 85 people donated; many I had not talked to or seen in over forty years. They saw my donation requests on LinkedIn, Facebook, and Instagram. It was amazing. Personally I raised around \$7500 for the ADA (American Diabetes Association) and I was awarded a special plaque as the number one fundraiser on Team Red. So many from CCSM donated, which was really uplifting.

People with diabetes who rode the tour were commemorated by riding with a "Red Rider" jersey. The community was so supportive. As we rode past city streets, people honked their horns and onlookers on the corners were ringing cow bells. Volunteers all over the place were yelling out support for us as we rode by. I was deeply touched by this and it made my ride so very special and memorable. The rest stops were well equipped and the lunch and celebration—well, let us just say that we gained weight on this ride!





I had a picture of my mom, dad, and myself in younger times on the bike, and this ride was dedicated for them. You see, I did not know it, but all of us in the picture had diabetes at the time, and were unaware of it! That is the kicker for this dreadful disease. It is estimated that more than 93 million Americans have diabetes or pre-diabetes, and most of them don't know it either.

I want to acknowledge how many CCRiders went along on this ride with me—Linda Skromme, Mark Meyers, Jim and Alison Schwandt. Their support and love was just amazing and I was deeply touched. My wife Kathy joined the ride even though she is really afraid of riding on the street. Several others that ride with us every Saturday morning also joined me, Jym Clendenin, Charlie Kennedy, and Peter Held's relatives from the Rey family—his daughter's husband and family—Javier, Diego and father Juan.

Together, we raised more than \$10,000 for the ADA. That was just spectacular. This ride is the number one fundraiser for the ADA in the country, and we raised over \$1.1 million. Truly amazing what you can do when we work together for the common good!

# HAVE YOU HEARD? HOPE IN GOD'S BACKYARD

This article was posted on November 8, 2023 on <u>Upwellings: News & Information from NCNC-UCC</u> and gives us a glimpse of the good work Penny has been doing since she left CCSM.



ast month I was on my way to a Non-Profit Housing Conference. I emerged out ⊿of the BART station at Powell Street in San Francisco and at the top of the stairs was a man sleeping/passed out/unconscious draped across an open suitcase as his pallet. Momentarily overwhelmed with powerlessness and hopelessness, I continued on to the conference a block away. I walked into a beautiful hotel and found myself in a crowd of almost a thousand people, all there because they care about homelessness and affordable housing. My first reaction was a feeling of despair because of the inequities and ironies of being in a beautiful, safe, expensive, clean, and inviting hotel working on solutions so that no one in the richest nation in the world would have to sleep in an open suitcase on the street. But I quickly moved from despair to hope. What gave me hope was that this conference represent-

ed just a small percentage of people in California who are engaged in the important justice work of solving homelessness and working to produce more affordable homes, particularly for low-income neighbors and

My favorite definition of hope is engagement. And what really gives me hope, against what can feel like an insurmountable problem, is that faith communities all over the state are engaging at new and exciting levels, opening tremendous possibilities.

Many of you are aware that SB4, affectionately referred to as YIGBY (Yes in God's backyard) passed through the senate and assembly with resounding success and then, just a few weeks ago, was signed by Governor Newsom. SB 4, authored by Wiener, rezones land owned by religious organizations and nonprofit colleges to allow for affordable housing on their property. Broad coalitions, including many faith communities, supported this bill and made its success possible.



All the latest research reveals that the number one proven solution to homelessness is to build more affordable housing, especially permanent supportive housing with wraparound services. This bill paves the way for that to happen. Now all we need is for faith communities, often cash poor but land rich, to explore the opportunities that their land might offer. As people of faith, we have done well providing food, blankets, water, medicine... but now, how about homes?

When I retired from parish ministry after almost three decades, I wanted to continue the justice work I had been doing—and I wanted to be able to do that full time. When I looked at all the justice issues I cared so deeply about, I kept finding housing justice at the center. So it was a natural segue for me to work in affordable housing. The Housing Leadership of San Mateo County contracts with me to do faith organizing for advocacy work, and the County of San Mateo as their Faith Communities Housing Liaison.

This didn't happen in a vacuum though. Eight years ago, a few colleagues and I founded the Peninsula Solidarity Cohort (pscohort.org). We are a coalition of about 30 diverse faith leaders, and we unite for formation, reflection, and collective action. We ground ourselves in the common good and aspire to be a compassionate moral compass for San Mateo County. This work has transformed each of us. We address the most pressing social justice issues in the county and are led by those most impacted. Being the co-director of the cohort is one of the most rewarding things I have ever done. And the work has enabled me to build deep relationships with faith communities all over the county as well as relationships with people from all different sectors.

Back to hope—as faith communities across the NCNC, we have an opportunity to be part of the solution to homelessness and to the crisis of housing affordability. California has one of the highest functional poverty rates in the nation, and that is due in large part to our high housing costs. Using our land to provide homes may be one of the best legacies we can leave. I am so proud to be part of a denomination that "gets it". There are already a number of churches engaged in exploring using their land, and I feel confident that more will join in the momentum and that the NCNC can make an even greater impact going forward. No matter who you are, or where you are on life's journey, we all deserve a safe and secure place to live.

This holiday season, CCSM will again be working with LifeMoves' First Step for Families. Instead of "Adopt-A-Family" as it has been called in the past, it is now **A CHRISTMAS WISH LIST**. First Step for Families provides temporary shelter and services for families experiencing homelessness in San Mateo County.

Sadly, LifeMoves is finding that family members need very basic items, so we will be asking CCSM members/attendees/friends to purchase gifts selected by LifeMoves staff for each individual. Admittedly, donating necessities is not as personal and enjoyable as selecting fun gift items for each person as we have done in past years, however, the need is still as great as ever.



In addition, the 17 residents of the Vendome (another LifeMoves program) in downtown San Mateo are chronically homeless adults who will not have much this Christmas. On our CHRISTMAS WISH LIST Christmas tree, CCSM would like to have a few extra ornaments listing items to give the Vendome residents so they may also experience some joy during this time.

Please look for the WISH LIST Christmas tree on the loggia on two Sundays, December 3<sup>rd</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup>, after the service. Stop by and pick up an ornament or two with suggested gift items to purchase and return to CCSM by Friday, December 15<sup>th</sup> at the latest (earlier is better).

We will also incorporate the Sunday virtual and Wednesday evening service attendees into our effort this year. Please look for more information in the Sunday bulletins and/or Connections.


## ANGELA KRAFT CROSS: CELEBRATING 30 YEARS OF EXCELLENCE AND INNOVATION AT CCSM


