Greetings, Church!

It's hard to believe that Lent is upon us. You might be thinking, already? Lent is early this year, but not the earliest it could be. A fun fact for your next trivia night: Easter is a floating holiday that could occur between March 22-April 25. In the Western Christian tradition, Easter falls the first Sunday after the spring equinox. The beginning of Lent is 6 weeks prior to Easter

Sunday; well, 6 weeks and some change (the beginning of the season is marked on Ash Wednesday). Traditionally, Lent is a time of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. It is a period of preparation and reflection, all in an effort to bring us closer to God, or to "recenter" our lives on the Divine as we look towards celebrating resurrection on Easter Sunday.

This Lent, we are focusing on the life and faith of one of Jesus' most famous disciples: Peter. After Jesus, Peter is the most frequently mentioned individual in the Gospels

and the New Testament. He was one of the first disciples called, and he was a constant presence in Jesus' ministry.

CHILDREN, YOUTH AND FAMILIES

Happy New Year! Our children, youth, and families had an especially wonderful Advent and Christmas season. It seems to me like that was a long time ago now, but I think the key moments warrant repeating! Highlights included youth-led carolling after church at homes of several CCSM members (youth helped to teach the carols and to assist the kids in making crafts/cards to bring to the members), a special global Christmas celebration where the kids learned about different

Christmas traditions around the world (particularly focused on Central and South America) including making mini-piñatas, learning the piñata song, and making alfajore cookies, a wonderful experience of Las Posadas, a multi-church UCC Advent youth retreat, and a youth-written Christmas pop-up Christmas pageant on Christmas Eve. Those are just a few of the many activities we did to learn about this wonderful season. On Sundays and Wednesdays, we explored the theme of a weary world rejoicing through the Advent themes of hope, peace, joy, and love. We explored the Biblical stories and read many wonderful kids' books that put a contemporary spin on the ancient tales. What a season!

As we moved into January, our kids have been exploring the theme of following the light and sharing our gifts, based on the Epiphany story. We have talked about the sources of hope and direction we can turn to when life is confusing or hard and the gifts we can bring to serve others. This particularly connected well to our celebration of Dr. Martin Luther King. We are so grateful to Lin Fenn who spent time with our kids to bring two special crafts to both Wednesday and Sunday attendees—beautiful night sky art and special night lights for the kids to take home. We had great conversation about how looking to the stars can remind us of how much more we as people have in common with one another and also how nightlights can be a reminder of God's love and care especially at night when we might feel lonely, scared, or unsure.

We are also using some great kids books about people who have offered their gifts in service of faith and justice in the world. These stories are wonderful starting places to then work with the kids to reflect on their own gifts and what they can do to be leaders in service of justice and peace.



This connected well also to our service projects on Dr. Martin Luther King Jr Day as several families participated in the Peninsual Multifaith Coalition's Day of Service.

For families, we have continued our tradition of playdates and lunch after church on the first Sunday of the month. In January, we shared pizza, Christmas memories, and played boardgames. In Feburary we will be engaging in community service. Families are always welcome to take the lead to host our events, or just share their ideas for what they'd like to do!

For youth, we had a wonderful **60 Minutes** conversation in January where we reflected on 2023 personally and in our world. The youth shared their proudest accomplishments and their hopes for the new year. This is an especially meaningful time as several youth are preparing to go off to college so they are anticipating a meaningful but very different year! This led to their choice of a topic for February where they chose to discuss regional differences within the US, exploring why those exist, if they are a problem, and what it might be like to explore living in a new region. Also, our youth have continued to offer leadership to our kids and for themselves as they have worked to plan several important events. The next will be a special multicultural Mardi Gras/Carnaval/ Pancake Tuesday evening on February 11!

Looking toward Lent, we will be engaging on both Sundays and Wednesdays with the wider church's theme of Wandering Hearts and taking a specific focus on prayer. We will be writing prayers, praying in color, praying with our bodies, through music, and exploring how we can bring the concerns of our hearts to God in this way. Lent is always a special season and a time to go deep with our children and youth, exploring our ancient faith and "still-speaking" spirit that is ever changing.

LATINO MINISTRY UPDATE

In December our Latino Ministry celebrated four important milestones:

- Rev. Álvaro received his work permit from the federal Immigration and Naturalization Service.
- The Silicon Valley Community
 Foundation made a grant to CCSM
 for \$40,000 to help support our
 community action and social
 justice work with our North Central
 neighbors and Latino/as throughout
 San Mateo. Most of this grant will
 help to pay for the share of Rev.
 Álvaro's time that is devoted to this
 work.
- * CCSM's Board of Directors signed a contract to employ Rev. Álvaro as our Transitional Minister for Latino Ministry for the next 11 months. If we obtain one more grant, it will be extended to a full year. Rev. Jessica formally commissioned him at both Sunday and Wednesday services in January.
- CCSM'S Scholarship Committee granted a scholarship to Emelin Perez to help support her studies at California State University/Fresno. Emelin is the second member of our Latino community to receive a CCSM scholarship, along with her cousin, Ashley Lopez.

ANNUAL REPORT UPDATE

More than 100 voting members of the Congregation attended the Annual Meeting on January 21, to receive an overview of our finances for 2023, consider the proposed budget for 2024, consider a few changes in the Bylaws, elect new lay leaders, honor those in our community whom we have lost this year, and hear from the Senior Minister and the outgoing and incoming moderators. The overview for 2023 finances and the budget for 2024 are highlighted below.

Having started 2023 with a planned shortfall of more than \$100,000, we were delighted to report that the year ended with a shortfall less than \$15,000 – a tribute to the generosity of the Congregation. Although expenses ran \$30,000 more than projected at the beginning of the year, revenue exceeded the budget by more than \$135,000.

The Congregation overwhelmingly approved the 2024 budget with its shortfall of slightly more than \$20,000, knowing that our

excess revenue over the years is more than sufficient to cover both the 2023 actual shortfall and the 2024 projected shortfall. More detail for both years will be provided in the Annual Report for 2023, soon to be published.

Let me take this opportunity to express appreciation to the Congregation for the trust you placed in me as Treasurer for the past several years. It has been an honor and privilege to serve in this capacity. I look forward to supporting the newly elected Treasurer, Martha Bronitsky, as well as the clergy, staff and other lay leaders as CCSM enters 2024 with renewed vitality.



REFLECTIONS OF A COFFEE HOUR COORDINATOR

A few years back, I began attending CCSM during the time when everyone wore masks and many functions were held outdoors. I was hoping to find a way to integrate into the social scene, but I didn't want to join any committees that involved going to meetings where people aired disagreements. I knew my weakness: in the face of inevitable conflict, I got terribly anxious. I asked myself, do I have the ability to be a cool, calm, and constructive committee member? My answer to myself was, "Not yet."

I decided I was better suited to a concrete, action-oriented service job. Although not exactly skilled in food preparation, inspiring others to add another task to their weekly to-do list, skillfully fielding feedback, and communicating well through spreadsheets and emails, I took on the task because Robert Leung emphasized the brighter aspects of the role. He said, "It's crucial that everyone has a place to relax and connect with each other. My mother always saw this work as essential to community building." And, he offered, "I'll help nearly every week." Soon after this conversation, Melodie Lew offered to work alongside Robert and me by facilitating smooth communications and inspiring people to sign-up to help bring in refreshments. She had a quiet personal approach that was very hard to say "no" to.

I accepted the position. The role helped me overcome shyness, a shortcoming that often left me feeling like an outsider. I also received needed practice in handling mild service-related issues with grace. I met a lot of church members and got to know them well. I received lots of encouragement. Gradually, I learned that there were many others who were also deeply immersed in service work,

CUETLAXOCHITL SUCCESS

If you saw the recent pictorial Pine Tree you saw pictures of some of the Advent season recipients of our plant deliveries. The joy it brings to our members is significant. In doing some reading I discovered some interesting facts about how this plant got the name that we use today... Poinsettia.

Joel Roberts Poinsett was an American diplomat, physician and botanist. At different points in his life he served as a member of the South Carolina legislature, the US House of Representatives, a Cabinet member, a US agent to Chile and Argentina, traveled extensively in Europe and was our first minister to Mexico. As a product of his time in history (early 1800's) he was a complicated man.

On the plus side: His interest in science and history led to the founding of the Smithsonian Institution, his travels in the southern hemisphere gave our country valuable information and contacts with our southern neighbors. He vigorously argued against the Nullification Act, opposed secession, and supported the "gradual end to slavery."

On the negative side: His reports were instrumental to the Monroe Doctrine's promotion of "manifest destiny," he owned 100 slaves, and he was the cabinet member responsible for the Trail of Tears and other efforts to relocate the indigenous peoples.

Since our plants are native to Mexico, maybe next year we'll deliver Flor de Nochebuenas (Christmas Eve flower) or Cuetlaxochitls (from the Aztec language). Whatever name we use, the program will continue to bring joy to the recipients and the deliverers.

ENVIRONMENTAL JUSTICE MINISTRY

One of the key alliances the CCSM Environmental Justice Ministry has established is with California Interfaith Power & Light (CAIPL). CAIPL was founded in 2000 at



sat down with Gregory to ask about his background and to learn about the goals and priorities of his group.

TELL US ABOUT YOUR BACKGROUND THAT LED YOU TO YOUR ROLE AT CAIPL.

I moved to California from Florida 13 years ago for graduate school at the Claremont School of Theology (CST) in Los Angeles. CST's theological approach is based on ecological thought, which understands reality as an interconnected vibrant web of ever unfolding and entangling relationality. After seminary, I found a home in Unitarian Universalism and greatly enjoy the multi-faith aspect of the faith. My position now at CAIPL blends interfaith work and climate justice. I educate faith communities on climate injustice and on how to bring about climate justice. We at CAIPL aim to equip our own faith communities with the

technologies available to reduce their reliance on fossil fuels.

WHAT ARE THE GOALS OF CAIPL?

CAIPL's main goal is to inspire and mobilize faith communities to take bold and just action on climate change. We do this through educational programs, interfaith councils representing different municipalities across California, developing Resilience Hubs for climate-disaster preparedness, helping congregations install solar panels and other electrification projects, and through policy and lobby work.

IS THERE A PARTICULAR FOCUS FOR 2024?

In 2024 we are working on home electrification with our congregational members utilizing rebates and incentives available by governments. We partner with Peninsula Clean Energy (PCE) to promote renewable energy use in San Mateo County. As you know, PCE has lower rates than PG&E, 100% renewable energy to power your home, and rebates/incentives to help folks acquire clean technology in the form of water heat pumps, induction stove tops, and electric vehicles.

HOW DOES CAIPL WORK WITH CONGREGATIONS?

We provide training for congregations on issues such as the renewable transition from fossil fuels, building electrification, and other aspects of climate change. We offer support in connecting congregations with solar installers and solar finance non-profits so faith communities can access the funds needed to complete their electrification projects. Our most recent partnerships helped two churches establish Resilience Hubs with solar arrays and battery back up storage in South San Francisco and East Oakland.

Melodie Lew (the new lead of our Congregational Care Ministry) and I are excited to launch this new effort, which we believe is a very good fit for CCSM.


If you are interested, you will be matched with

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS

Oscar and I are grateful to Jim Schwandt, lead of the Buildings and Grounds Ministry, for helping us to address some maintenance and repair issues facing our beautiful, but aging, church. At the top of the list is the elderly storm drain infrastructure. As

you can imagine, our vast roof collects a lot of rain water! That rain water runs into downspouts and feeds into underground clay pipes, that are estimated to be at least 75 years old, which then carry the water for dispersal. A section of these pipes from the parking lot doorway near where Rev. Jessica parks her car to the Little Wonders playground has failed and needs to be replaced.

Jim, Oscar and I are in the process of securing multiple bids from five different plumbing companies, each with their own creative solutions for moving that water. We want to do the job right, in a manner that will last for another 75 years, but one that will also be the most cost effective. So, we have been "shopping around" in earnest! As part of the required investigative work to determine the extent of the failure, the delivery ramp had to be partially excavated and remains closed. (Just a note that this ramp is not an actual wheelchair (ADA) ramp. It is too short and steep to meet those requirements. It is actually a delivery ramp. The wheelchair accessibility into the church is not impacted by this project.) But nonetheless, we want to restore access as quickly as possible for convenience and keyless entry access. After the final bid is in, sometime during the week of February 5th, the Finance Committee will make their decision about which contractor to go with, a decision that Jim Granucci and I will help them to make. Once the work is scheduled, it should take about a week to complete, assuming good weather and all going to plan. Now that's some faith! We empathize that a project of this scale poses an inconvenience, and we are working hard to complete this project as soon as possible.

Have you noticed the storage container that appeared on the east side of the parking lot? A furniture company called "Drop House" is renting space from us to place this container which will house furniture for customer pickup on Saturdays. We have contracted with them for a six-month trial period. Should we decide to extend for a year, this arrangement could yield \$7,200 for us each year. We are only losing one of our parking spaces and the Board felt the trade-off was worth the income. We

hope that, despite any inconvenience posed, you will applaud the creativity involved in finding new revenue for the church.

And speaking of finding revenue, we are continuing to work with Peer Space, an online rental platform similar to Airbnb. Sean Moran is generously helping me by responding to inquiries. Since December, we have had three bookings, which provided needed income. One of the additional benefits to outside rentals is that we have an opportunity to share CCSM and its mission with people who might not otherwise have heard of us. I am also in initial discussions with a provider of Art Camps for young children who is interested to rent the Community Room Monday through Friday, year-round. Making use of this space during the weekdays when it otherwise sits empty would not pose any inconvenience to our members and so, could be ideal as another revenue stream. Do you have any ideas you would like to share? I'm all ears!

John Neil has been successful in finding a more updated and less expensive provider for our telephone needs at the church. I was able to find a less expensive contract for a **new postal meter.** Cheryle Matteo and I met with a copier company who wants to work with us to reduce our monthly printing costs.

Please let me know if you have any questions about the above projects. Oscar, Zoe, Cheryle (the staff I supervise) and I are enjoying working with Rev. Jessica as she enters the New Year with new ideas and great energy. The church feels vibrant

and energetic moving toward the beautiful and thoughtful season of Lent. May God bless us all in this new season of change, growth and renewal!
