

### A Note from Jessica

#### Words for the Beginning

Advent, a season of endings and beginnings, is just around the corner. As the calendar year comes to a close, a new church year rushes in. Did you know Advent is the start of the church year? Christ's birth ushers us into new ways of living and loving — and yet, we feel the weight of many things coming to an end.

This December, we'll join churches across the country in revisiting the words of ancient scripture, words we need to hear again and again as we begin a new season. What will the Spirit say to us this season? How is God still speaking? While our weekly worship themes may feel like the lessons we teach children, in reality, these are lessons we continue to learn and relearn as adults. The stories we'll revisit are frequently used in weddings, ordination services, and baptisms, sacred messages we impart on loved ones during special ceremonies and sacred rituals:

Dec. 1 – You Are a Blessing Dec. 8 – We Can't Go Alone Dec. 15 – Do the Good That Is Yours to Do Dec. 22 – Hope Is Worth the Risk Dec. 24 – Love Knows Your Name Dec. 29 – Don't Forget to Laugh Jan. 5 – The Road Isn't Straight

As we enter this sacred season, let's hold fast to the reminders that will bolster us for the journey ahead. Now, more than ever, it's important that we lean into community and ground ourselves in God's love.

Throughout this edition of the Pine Tree you will find opportunities to connect, grow, and serve throughout the season, including a new worship opportunity on Sunday nights and beloved traditions like Las Posadas, Poinsettia deliveries, and our annual Cookie Exchange.

As I look toward Christmas, I think of Mary, who in many ways was surrounded by endings, beginnings, and the unknown — large and small, personal and political. 

### Samaritan House

Years ago, when the Samaritan House Dining Room lost its lease, CCSM hosted the dinners for a few months until the Dining Room could move to the Masonic Temple across the street. But now the Masonic Temple is up for sale, so CCSM stepped in this August to become the official new host site for Samaritan House dinners, cooking and serving dinners every weeknight from 4–6 pm.

Our hospitality has been a success. We started serving less than 100 people with very few of them staying in Kloss Hall to enjoy their dinners. Now we are serving about 300 meals with about 60 sitting at our round tables for conversation each evening. New friendships have developed; a number of our guests will sit for an hour talking to one another. Some of our dinner guests have even joined us for Sunday worship.

The response from our church members has been outstanding. Over 30 CCSM volunteers have become welcoming faces night after night, along with Samaritan House staff. Our members help to set up the Dining Room each evening, serve the meals, talk to our guests, and clean up afterwards. Other volunteers from the community assist and often ask about CCSM.

I can't be any prouder of the decision our church made to invite Samaritan House back into our church. Over the past couple of months, English language learners were paired with Practice Partners to build their confidence and conversational English language skills. Our effort was supported by English Together, which is a non-profit organization building community through conversation throughout the county (https://englishtogether.org/). The experience has been enriching for our community and those involved on a week-to-week basis.

Over eight weeks, our pairings engaged in conversation, practiced skills, and broke down walls sometimes in place due to challenges in communication. We plan on continuing the program from January – March 2025. Training sessions for Practice Partners will be the week of January 13th. # **Building Updates**

A summary of completed 2024 maintenance and repair projects at CCSM: \*We are so blessed that many of these completed projects were funded through the generosity of the Dana Scadden estate.\*

- Replaced storm drain system from the corner at the Sr. Pastor's office to Ellsworth Ave.
- Roof underlayment repaired and replaced between the CE Building and Kloss Hall
- Replaced the aging storm drain system that runs from the wheelchair ramp by the Main Office, turns the corner at Kloss Hall and now empties to Tilton Ave. bubbler system
- Painted the outside windows of the sanctuary, Tilton Ave. side and the Memorial Garden side
- Placed gutter shields in the gutters along the front and back of the church
- Treated the heritage live oak trees in the Memorial Garden for blight (Thank you Nancy Steele for funding!)
- Repaired and repainted two outside doors in the CE Building (Ellsworth Ave. side)
- Extensive campus-wide tree trimming and shaping\*\*
- Replaced the motor to the kitchen hood blower system
- Pruned the live oak tree by Ellsworth Ave.
- Investigated structural integrity of posts and beams in sanctuary
- Attended to area where old PINE TREE was located and developed a beautification plan
- Repaired main sewer line leak and replaced section of pipe
- Repaired wall in Narthex after removal of display case
- Outside balcony doors removed, repaired, and repainted



# Building 2024-25 & Beyond

#### A summary of future projects in the pipeline for end of 2024 – 2025:

- Replace underlayment of Kloss Hall roof
- Install bollards and/or renew the painted stripes in the parking lot to enhance accurate and safe parking
- Inspect and/or repair tiles on Tower roof
- Complete project to renew area where the old PINE TREE was located
- Remove two liquidambar trees in Little Wonders' playground (permit pending)
- Recoat Kloss Hall hardwood floor (Thank you Jim Granucci for funding)
- Remove carpet and strip hardwood floors in Senior Pastor's office
- Replace aging Back Flow apparatus/pipes outside Kloss Hall
- Install a two-way clean out to main sewer line to prepare for yearly maintenance
- Add flowering plants to the Memorial Garden for use by Liturgical Arts Ministry

#### Dream wish list for projects when funds are available (5-year plan):

- Paint the windows on the parking lot side of the church (office areas)
- Design and implement a plan for drought-tolerant landscape throughout the property (with EJ Ministry)
- Upgrade the CE building bathrooms
- Paint the outside of the entire church
- Upgrade the hearing-assist system in the Sanctuary
- Resurface and reseal the tiles on the Loggia
- Upgrade the sound system in Kloss Hall
- Reconfigure the Memorial Garden fountain so that it becomes a more usable feature
- Remove carpet and strip hardwood floors in the Main Office and Production Room
- Resurface the parking lot

\*\*With the leadership and expert guidance of Charlie Drechsler, the Buildings and Grounds team, led by Jim Schwandt, spent hundreds of hours cleaning, trimming, and shaping the bushes and trees around the property. They filled two large dumpsters and hauled several more truckloads of debris to the dump. (Thanks to Oscar for the use of his truck!) There is a lot more to do on this project, but so far, we have done all the work with volunteer members. Join us!

Thank you to the Board of Directors for their wisdom in investing funds toward the preservation of our church's legacy.

We are blessed to receive food from Samaritan House, congregants, and neighbors filling the box too. Most weeks, we donate our Sunday plate offering to a different charity. Recipients have included World Central Kitchen during a disaster, Planned Parenthood during Breast Cancer Awareness Month, Little Eagle during Native American Heritage Month, and Help a Mother Out (free diapers) on Mother's Day. We are not just supporting these organizations with our money but are also building relationships with the organizations and building awareness of their existence.

Recology San Mateo County sent two of its young representatives to CCSM to teach attendees about its services and to clarify its policies on recycling, composting, and trash disposal. Attended by 22 attentive people, the workshop began with a hands-on challenge for the audience to try to determine what bin various household items should go in. Was it for the blue recycling bin, the green composting bin, or the black garbage bin? The Recology reps then gave a slide presentation on the recommended guidelines to follow to maximize one's disposal decisions. A key point in their talk showed the importance of scraping

off leftover food into the compost bin. When using paper plates, scrape and then toss them into the composting bin. Bear in mind that any paper products that include a plastic liner are garbage. Another point they stressed is the fact that simply because a plastic item has the chasing arrows sign on it does not mean it is necessarily recyclable. In fact most plastic is NOT recyclable. Only 9% of all plastic gets recycled — mostly #1 plastic. The rest is incinerated or placed in a landfill. This is where our affiliation with the Precious Plastics Program (P3) comes into play, as they collect #s 2, 4, and 5 plastic and turn it into new, usable products. After the workshop, feedback from various attendees indicated that the workshop was very informative and worth attending. So keep on recycling!

### **Sturge 100th Anniversary**

#### On October 20, **Sturge Presbyterian Church celebrated its 100th Anniversary** as a Congregation. Out of gratitude, members of our church were invited to participate and several members attended the Service that Sunday. Kay Harris, representing the CCSM Board of Directors, presented a beautiful Orchid to Sturge Senior Minister, Drew Yamamoto. Rev. Álvaro also attended, along with Mike Harris, Betsy Woodward, and Phil Lind.

There has been a **100-year relationship between CCSM and Sturge Presbyterian Church**. In 1924, members of the Japanese community, many of them first-generation immigrants, wanted to start a church in San Mateo. The Congregational Church of San Mateo, under the leadership of Rev. Charles Kloss, agreed to provide space for them to worship. The new Congregation was called The Japanese Independent Union Church of San Mateo. They worshipped in our Sanctuary from 1924 until World War II. The Church held Japanese-language worship services twice a month and had a thriving

Sunday School for the children. Members of



After the outbreak of World War II, racial tension flared up on the West Coast. In response, the Board of Trustees met on December 15, 1941 and issued a statement in support of the Japanese Union Church. Drafted by Rev. Sydney Buckham, the statement read: "As a token of our faith in your loyalty to our common Christian Principles, the Congregational Church of San Mateo, at this time, renews its welcome to the Japanese Union Church to continue to worship in our church. We pledge ourselves to keep unbroken the bond of Christian fellowship with your church as an essential expression of our belief in the Fatherhood of God, and the brotherhood of all

men."

A few months after the Declaration of War against Japan, Special Order 9066 was issued by President Franklin Roosevelt in response to the growing hysteria, fear, and hostility toward Japanese Americans living on the West Coast. The order put in motion the relocation and incarceration of 120,000 Japanese Americans. Just weeks after the order was issued, six Japanese members of the Japanese Union Church applied for membership at CCSM. At the March 27, 1942 meeting of the Trustees, the following is recorded in the minutes: "It was the unanimous opinion of those present that they should be accepted into membership and that the church committee would be ready to answer any criticism that might arise."

During the war, CCSM also cared for the personal property of the Japanese community in the attic space above Kloss Hall. There is a long supportive relationship between CCSM and Sturge Presbyterian Church. May it continue.

#### Sunday, December 18:


